for the grant when it met March 3.

The total cost of the project would be about \$500,000-600,000.

"The rent from the doctor and dentist would pay for the mortgage and maintenance

costs," said Schreiber Reeve Bob Krause.

If the grant is approved, Council hopes the building will be finished before the end of this year.

The proposed location for the centre would be on Scotia

Street in Schreiber, near Holy Angels Catholic Church on Superior Street.

In order to qualify for the grant, the Township must show a need for a new centre in its application.

views on what should be done, although most in attendance said they couldn't remember receiving a questionnaire.

The only thing in the hall right now is the town library, and nothing else can be moved there unless its renovated to meet fire and building codes.

"It (the hall) hasn't been kept up, and you're talking major renovations for that building" to keep it open Krause said.

He said that among the problems with the hall are

cracked walls, the basement takes in water when it rains, and the walls are cracked.

Council did quash rumours some people at the meeting had heard, that a decision to tear down the hall had already been made.

"There's been nothing decided," Krause said.

Councillor Lorraine Huard said that a more pressing priority was the Recreation Centre.

"If we don't do something with the Rec Centre, we're going to have to close it," she said.

One possibility being considered is moving the library into the medical building—assuming the new medical/dental centre is built—and closing down the hall entirely, Krause said.

"That would save the taxpayer \$25,000 a year," he said.

"It seems a damn shame to tear down a building that's been around since everybody in this room was a kid," one man said.

Council said they would take the delegation's views into consideration when any decisions are made.
