

## MNR announces release independent internal study

MNR's office in Terrace Bay will close at noon for one hour, and at 4:30 pm, to allow MNR staff to carry out improved outreach training, science and technology transfer and increased co-management group commitments through the redeployment of staff.

The refocusing of Terrace Bay District efforts to improve co-management partnerships with the public has already been increasing over the past year.

The Rosspoint Island Development Board was organized with members of the public from Schreiber, Terrace Bay, Rosspoint and Pays Plat Indian Reservation.

Its goal is to prepare a management plan of the Rosspoint Islands. It is expected they will present a plan by early 1993 to assist and guide the development and uses of the Rosspoint Island Group.

Another group, the Timber Management Plan Stakeholders Committee, is made up of member of the public from Manitowadge and Caramat.

Members come from both private and industrial back-grounds, and the group has been ongoing in Manitowadge to develop a five year plan for the Big Pic forest resource users. This major planning effort, including full public input, has recently been approved.

Several other public advisory committees will be working in partnership with MNR in the future on resource uses as diverse as timber harvesting, road uses and access, land use and development, fisheries and wildlife use plans, and brook harvest trout allocations.

Ministry staff are also providing their assistance as members on community committees such as tourism development, waterfront development and land use concerns.

Copies of the "Terrace Bay District Market Analysis Study" by Lehman and Associates, have been distributed to the public libraries and Township Councils in Schreiber and Terrace Bay, as well as to Rosspoint and Pays Plat.

## Report calls for new conservation fishing licences

The province has released *Fishing and Hunting Licence Review*, which, among other things, calls for a conservation licence.

The conservation licence, proposed in the report, would allow anglers to pay a reduced fee if they agree to reduced catch limits. It would be aimed at reducing the harvesting of fish in Ontario, and fostering support for the conservation of Ontario's fisheries resource.

The report recommends that the current wildlife licence structure be maintained, with minor changes to remove or combine some licences.

The report also recommends introducing an identification card for resident hunters and anglers. Validation stickers could be placed on this credit-card style identification card, replacing some of the current paper licences.

The report suggests all licence fees be revised.
