Criminal court

On Wednesday, May 6, Judge Clark presided over criminal court.

Eric Babcock was found guilty of a Schreiber OPP charge of Common Assault. He was fined \$250 and received one year probation.

Maria Carangi was found guilty of a Schreiber OPP charge of Public Mischief. Her

fine was one year probation.

Andrew N. Lauzon was found guilty of a Terrace Bay Police Services charge of Failing to Signal. He was fined \$78.75.

John Vanderwerf was found guilty of an RCMP charge of having Possession of a Narcotic. He was fined \$10,000 or three years in jail.

The next Criminal Court date is set for June 3, 1992.

Police report

According to the Terrace Bay Police Services report, there were a total of 72 occurrences in the month of April.

Out of that, there were 17 offences under the criminal

code, including one break and enter, two assaults, nine thefts, two trespasses by night, and one case each of mischief, abduction and fraud.

Four people were charged with five offences under the Criminal Code, including three people charged under the Young Offenders Act and one person charged under the Narcotics Control Act.

For the first month in a while, there were no motor vehicles accidents for the entire month. There were 27 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act, and one charge under the Liquor Licence Act.

Terrace Bay Police Services also gave welfare assistance to five persons.
