Students at Schreiber Public School have chosen a design for their "green space"—a 30 x 30 foot lot beside their school

currently covered in gravel. The winning entry was designed by grade six student Elissa Glad. Each class put forward a design for the space, each of

which were displayed in the school's hallways. Each class was given an opportunity to view each proposal, and then vote for which design they liked best.

The lot was purchased by the school board from CP rail, and a house that was on the property was torn down last fall. The local Ministry of Natu-

ral Resources office has offered to lend the school some expertise in its redesign of the area.

It also will provide some black earth so grass and flowers may be grown, and it will also donate some trees.

Among other things, the winning entry calls for putting in several flower beds, benches, bird baths, and shrubberies.

A commemorative plaque will be erected on the lot in honour of the winning entry.

Just how much of the plan will be implemented will be decided soon, says Schreiber Public School Principal John St. Amand.

"A lot of it depends on budget considerations," he says.

"But as much of the plan as possible will be implemented this year."

construction company, how do you say no to the others?" said Ziegler.

He said council does want development along the highway, but not construction camps.

"Picture driving into Terrace Bay and all you see are trailer camps," he said. "Is that what you want Terrace Bay to look like?—nothing but trailer camps along the highway?"

Ziegler said Council told Lacharity that there were areas in town zoned for what he wanted to do, specifically the Aguasabon Trailer Park. Joe Marcella, who owns the park, was at the meeting. Councillor Chris Joubert, who leases the park from Marcella, declared a conflict of interest on the matter, and didn't attend the special meeting. When the matter was discussed at the regular meeting of Council May 11, Joubert left the room.

"Everyone on Council told him that we wanted him to do business here, but the bylaws didn't permit him to do what he wanted in that area (next to the old Texaco station)," said Ziegler.
