Handi-transit article could be misleading

Information about fares contained in the news article 'Handi-transit bus fares to and from Rosspoint in limbo' (News, June 16) is misleading.

The current fare of \$5 for a disabled person of any age is correct, but if a disabled person requires an assistant, the assistant travels free..

A senior citizen who is not disabled does not need an assistant. A senior citizen who is not disabled might want to travel with a companion. If the companion is not a senior citizen, then the companion will pay \$10.

The Ontario Ministry of Transportation supplies a substantial subsidy toward the cost of transporting disabled persons of any age, but there is no subsidy for senior citizens or non-disabled persons.

When the feasibility study and recommendations to councils were made by the Steering Committee for a Handi-transit bus system, the financial climate was more favourable and there was hope that Rosspoint and Jackfish could find some funding for their shares of the costs.

Therefore both committees were included in the projected service. It is regrettable that circumstances have changed and the service is not as helpful

to these persons as originally anticipated.

"I think the courts are trying to spread the word that they're not going to tolerate that sort of behaviour."

The key to the solving the case, says Dennis, was public cooperation.

"This case never would have come to light without the public's help," he says. "And we're getting more and

more of it every year. There's only two of us covering about 6,000 square miles of land, so if people don't talk to us, it makes it pretty tough."

The MNR laid around 120 charges under the Game and Fish Act last year, says Dennis, but only a small number of them go to court.

If the offence isn't too serious, the offenders can pay an out of court fine, comparable to a speeding ticket.

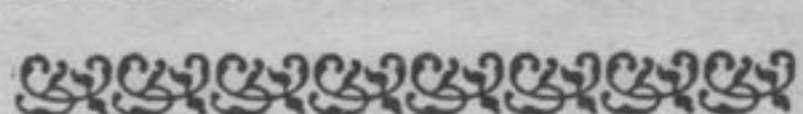
