Council does, and possibly cutting back on the cost of the municipal Christmas party as well, Council hopes to reduce the amount to \$76,520.

Other cuts include the elimination of fireworks on the July 1 holiday, which is expected to save the township about \$11,000.

"There will still be a celebration," says Fulton. "There just won't be any fireworks.

In other highlights, welfare is expected to cost the township more this year, from \$13,392 last year to \$24,000 this year.

Major capital expenditures include \$47,590 for the street sweeper, \$9,525 for turnout gear for the fire department, and \$59,093 spent on the gorge development, completed this past spring.

Overall, the Municipality has spent or plans to spend \$175,618 on capital project in 1992, down from \$263,990 last year.

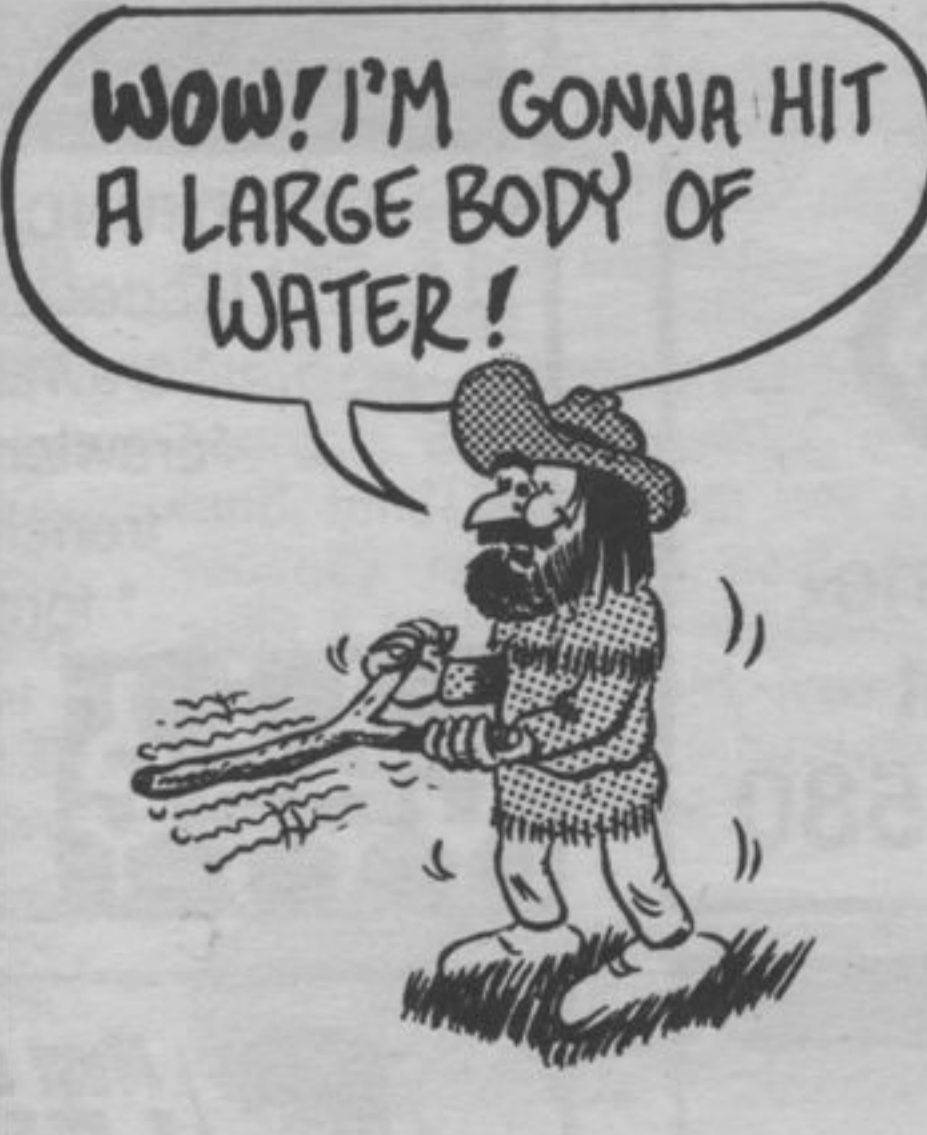
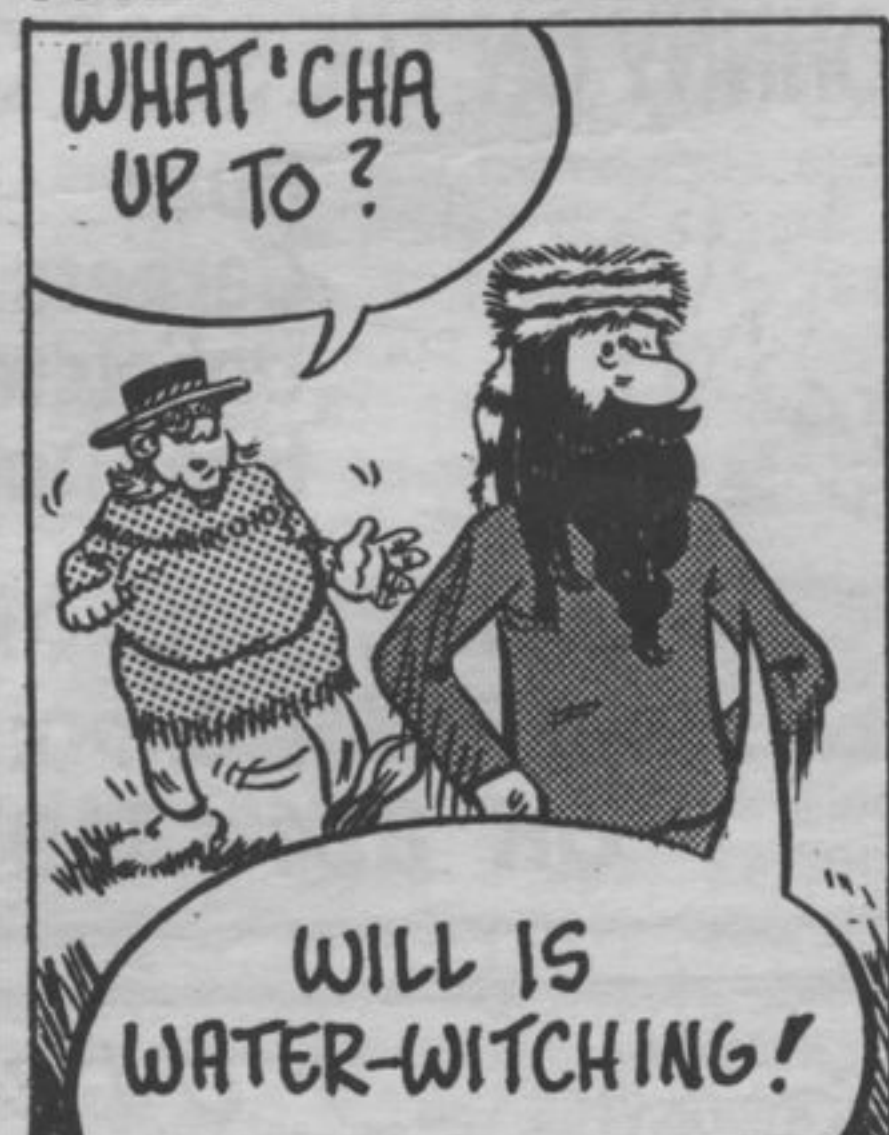

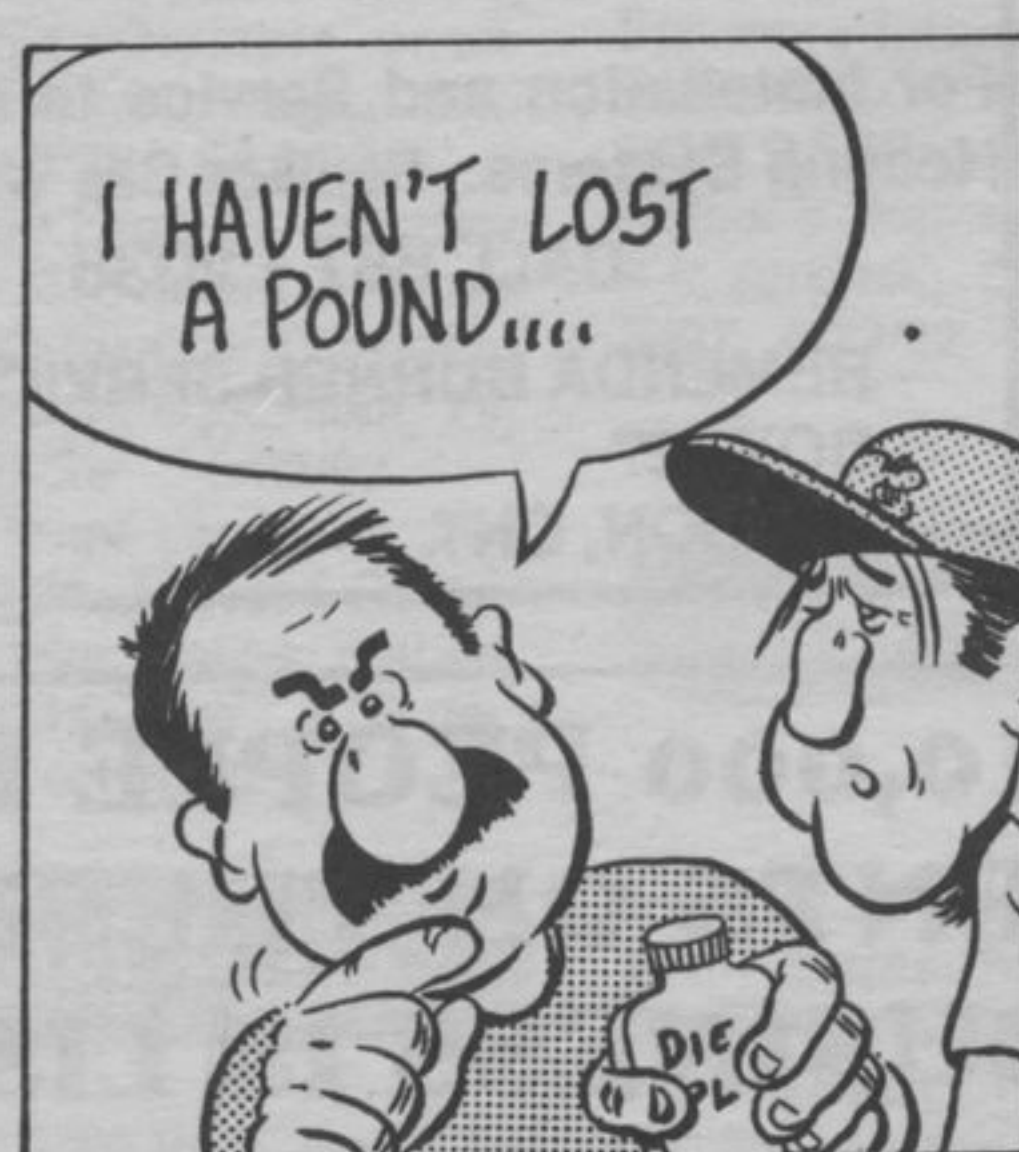
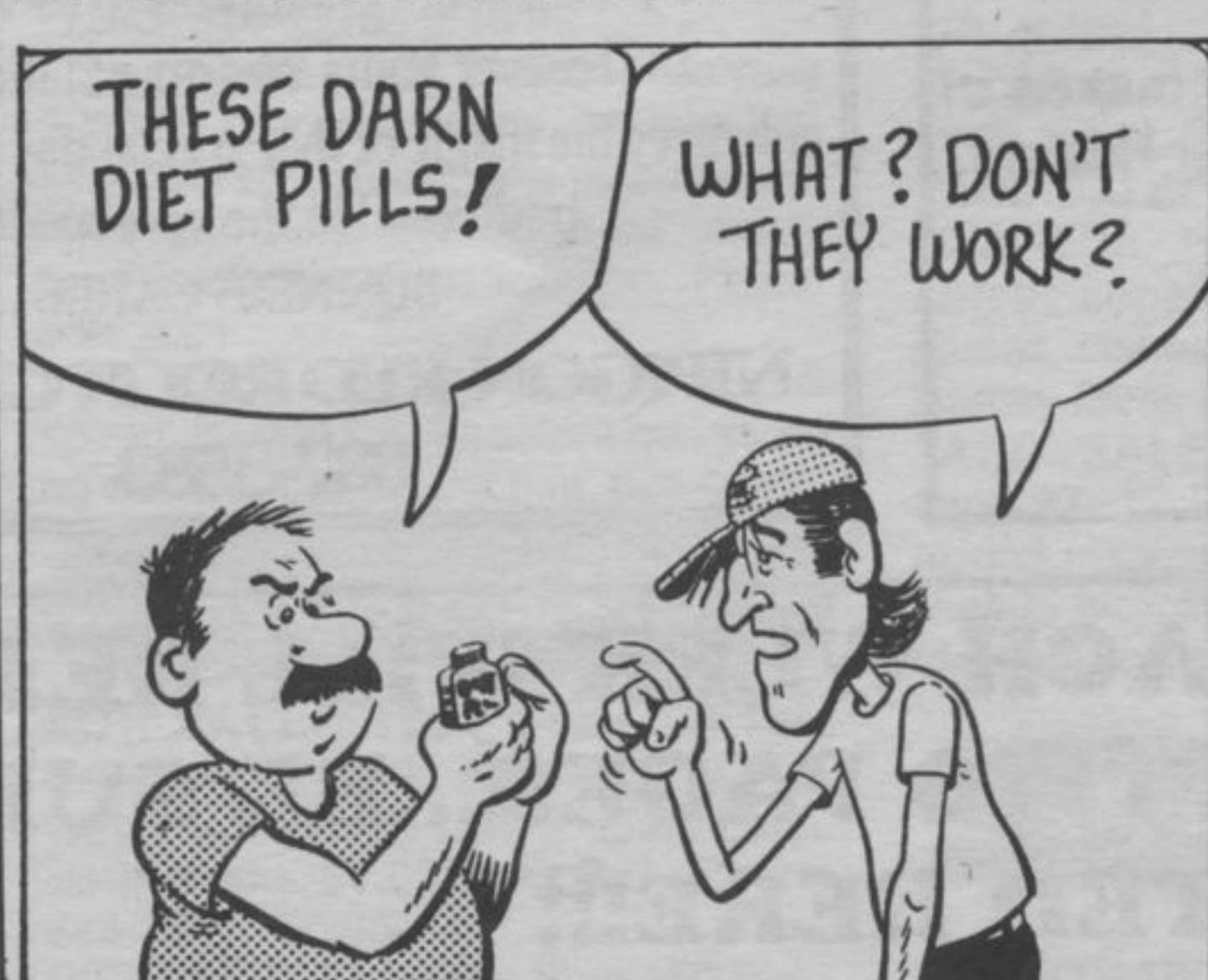
Mr. & Mrs. Ed Borutski are pleased to announce the graduation of their daughter, Donna, from Confederation College on May 16, 1992.
