Menon grievance goes in July

The grievance filed by former Lake Superior High School Principle Balan Menon will go through the first stage of arbitration this July in Toronto, say LSBE Director of Education Ian McQuarrie.

"At that time, the arbiters will hear the first merits of the situation from both sides," says McQuarrie.

He says that until the case goes through the first stage, it's difficult to know which way the arbiters will decide.

"No one can be very specific about it at this point," he says.

Menon filed the grievance last December after his proba-

tionary contract was not renewed by the LSBE.

Angus upset with new CN head

New Democratic Party Transport Critic Iain Angus (Thunder Bay-Atikokan) says the appointment of Privy Council Clerk Paul Tellier as head of Canada's publicly owned railroad is outrageous.

"CN needs a railroader at the top, not a professional bureaucrat" said Angus. "While I and my colleagues may not have agreed with the actions that outgoing CEO

Ron Lawless took at CN, at least he grew up within the industry and had first hand experience, so he knew the direct effect of his actions."

"Tellier, on the other hand, has grown up in the Federal Bureaucracy, most recently being responsible for constitutional strategy," observed Angus. "What strengths will he bring to the job of running a railroad . . . organizing first ministers conferences on branch line abandonment?"

"It is clear that the Prime Minister is more interested in payment to loyal workers than in advancing railroads and railroaders," said Angus.

"The Prime Minister has shown on a number of occa-

sions that he is insensitive to those things the bind this country together . . . VIA Rail, Canada Post, Air Canada and now CN. The country is poorer because of this appointment," said Angus.

charged with assault occasioning bodily arm, and a third man

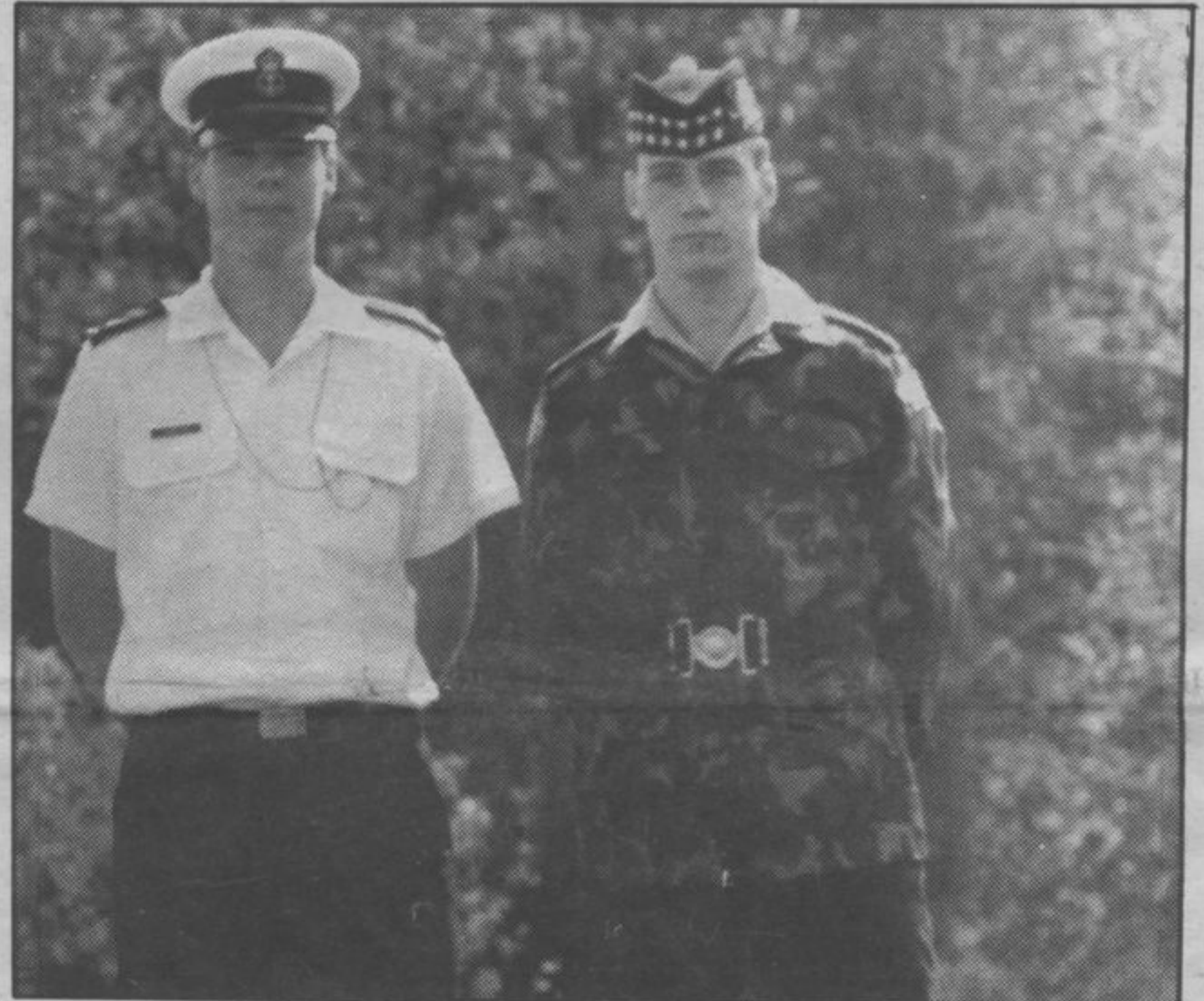
will be charged with careless use of a firearm.
