No changes at Minnova

It's business as usual at Min-

nova Inc., in the wake of that company's sale to the Metall Mining Corporation.

"It's my understanding that there will be no change whatsoever in day-to-day operations at Winston Lake," says Mine Manager Tom Dickson. "The company was bought lock, stock and barrel from the president right on down to myself."

Kerr Addison sold its 50.4 per cent interest in Minnova to Metall in a deal announced July 27. The purchase is subject to government approval, and is valued at \$136.6 million.

"It's my understanding that this is just a straight economic decision," says Dickson. "Someone wanted to sell something, and someone else wanted to buy it."

The mine at Winston Lake

employs about 160 people and expects to continue full operations for at least another 4 1/2 years.

"If anything, we're looking at this as something that's very positive for us," says Dickson. "A new owner is bound to want to make things go."
