Parents get a scare when sons go missing

There was a happy ending to a potentially unpleasant story last Thursday evening when two missing four-year-old boys were found safe and sound.

The boys went missing around 5:30 pm, Oct. 22, near Southridge Crescent in Terrace Bay. One of the searchers, Darren McLean, found them near the Aguasabon Beach at 8 pm.

The parents of Warren Sands and Torrin Crevier

thought the children were playing at a friend's house when they called them in for dinner.

"But when we went over to get them, they weren't there," says Doug Sands, Warren's

father. "So of course, we started to scour the neighbourhood."

At first, Sands says the search party consisted of him-self and his wife and Torrin's parents.

"And we looked in some of the areas (Warren) goes to normally, assuming it was just a matter of getting in the right yard and bringing them home," says Sands.

After looking in the area around their Southridge Crescent home, he says they expanded their search to include the neighbouring streets. And as they did, more and more people joined the search.

"It seemed like there were people from all over the place," says Sands. "There were people from our street, and quite a few people from other streets in the area. And before it was over, the fire

department was involved, as well as the Terrace Bay Police and the OPP."

Sands says even Kimberly-Clark was set to get involved just before the boys were found.

"Some people

were saying they had seen (the boys) out in the back near the bush, so we started looking in between the beach and where we live on Southridge," he says.

"There were people just coming down and helping out—anyone that was available."

Finally, around 8 o'clock, Darren McLean spotted the boys, walking along a creek bed.

"They were a couple of hundred yards away from the shore, way up in the bush," says Sands. "I don't know exactly what they were doing."

Torrin and Warren were wet, and starting to get a bit worried. But other than that, Sands says they were fine.

"They didn't seem overly worried at all, actually," he says. "They were just off on a little trip. . . . But (Warren) still doesn't seem to be too concerned about it, although we have tried to explain to him exactly what the problem was."
