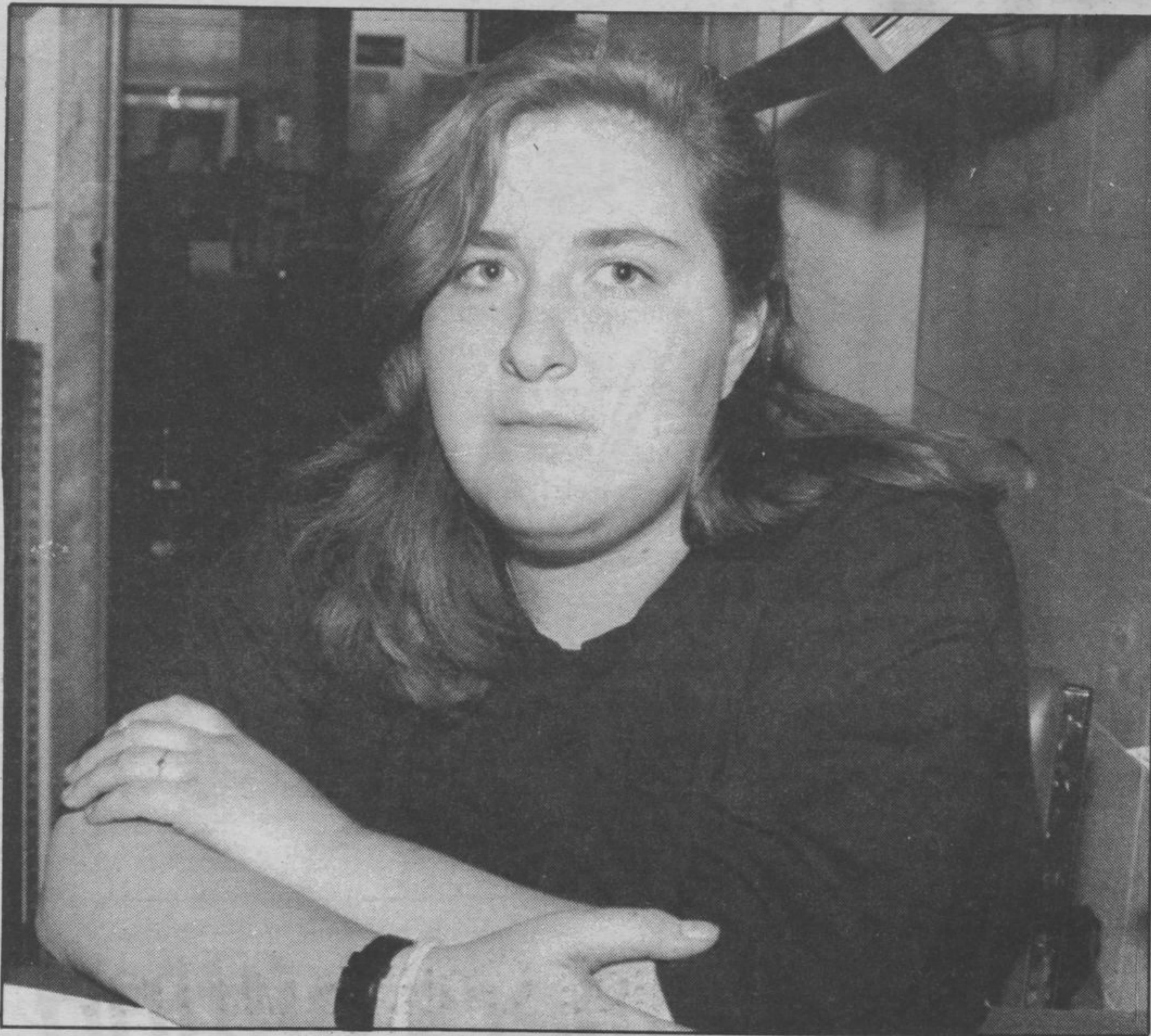


# Fewer students shadow employers

The number of students participating in this year's Job Shadowing program dropped sharply compared with last year.

"There's been a big drop-off in student participation this year, and we don't know why," says Community Futures' Leslie Dickson, who organizes the program.

More than 170 job placements were available with 30 companies in Schreiber and Terrace Bay, but only 42 students took advantage of the opportunity.

That compares with 86 students who took part last year, and 67 who took part in 1990, the program's first year.

Those who did participate spent last Tuesday or Thursday shadowing someone who works at a job the student might be interested in after high school. They had the opportunity to find out things like what a typical day at that job involves, the education they would need, the kind of salary they could expect, etc.

The Schreiber-Terrace Bay job shadowing is connected to Career Week, which was Nov. 1-7 right across Canada.

"Not every place does job shadowing, and it's not just limited to Career Week or high school students," says Dick-

son. "It can be used for college students or adults who have lost their jobs and are looking for a new line of work."

Dickson says Canada Employment Centres will sometimes use job shadowing to help laid off workers decide what kind of retraining they want to do.

"For example, at Abitibi (Price) in Thunder Bay, where an entire pulp mill shut down," she says, "a lot of those people have practically no chance of getting a job at another mill in that area, so they have to look at retaining. But, just like a high school student, they have to know what they want to do before they retrain."

Locally, Dickson says the response from employers has been excellent.

"Three years ago there was probably over 200 placements," she says. "But even though the number of placements is less, I think the variety of jobs has increased."

This year, students were reminded that they are only
