unheard of in these days of politician-hating. Moreover, he's managed to maintain his popularity without resorting to the kind of Ottawa bashing for which Maritime Premiers are famous. Although he speaks french about as well as Jean Chretien speaks english, he has strong Francophone support in and outside of the province.

While it's a bit early to pass judgement, British Columbia Premier Mike Harcourt is also making a lot of promising noises. He consulted with labour and business groups before introducing labour law reform, which was announced with nary a squawk from business and labour groups. And this in a province ruled by the right of right wing Social Credit party for the last couple of decades. Although his government fumbled a bit during the referendum campaign—a lot, actually—it still holds a lot of promise.

What these three politicians have in common is that they refuse to fit into the stagnant mold traditionally associated with their respective parties. And when they're on television, you get the impression they're saying what they really think, not what some media advisor has told them they should say.

Many Canadians may vote Liberal, NDP or Reform in the next election because it's a vote against Brian Mulroney. How much better it would be if we had a chance to vote for someone we liked, for someone who we could trust to lead us somewhere.

Unfortunately, all of the major federal parties are currently led by less-than-inspir-

ing leaders. We wouldn't let them lead us to a free weekend at Canada's Wonderland.
