On Wednesday, Nov. 18, Judge Clark presided over a full criminal offences court.

Floyd Caldwell was found guilty of a Terrace Bay Police Services charge of careless storage of a firearm. His fine was \$300 and a conditional discharge.

Jean Paul Poulin was found guilty of a Schreiber OPP charge of assaulting the police. His penalty was 60 hours of community service work and an apology to Const. Bannon.

The snowmobile season is here again, and the OPP would like to remind the public of some of the laws pertaining to your safety and enjoyment.

When operating your machine on a road, such as within the Township of Schreiber, the speed limit for snowmobiles is 20 km/hr, not 50 km/hr.

You are obliged to obey all other regulations, such as obeying stop signs, driving on the correct side of the road, etc.

You may not operate your machine on the maintained portion of Hwy 17. In other words, you must drive between the shoulder and the bush line. Crossing a street or highway must be done at a 90 degree angle.

You must be a licensed driver, either for a motor vehicle or for motorized snow vehicles. Insurance is required, and you must produce these documents at the request of a police officer or conservation officer on demand, anywhere expect on your own property.

Within our area, there are several locations where property owners have erected no trespassing sings. Please respect these owners and stay off their properties.

Have a safe season, and don't drink and drive.

Highway service to be maintained

According to a press release

from the Ministry of Transportation, Minister Gilles Pouliot has told ministry staff to ensure the 1992-93 maintenance program will be maintained at the same level as last winter.

"Our districts have been directed to provide service at the same level as previous years," Pouliot is quoted as saying. "At the same time, we'll be looking for ways to become more efficient."

He has also directed the ministry to review criteria it uses to determine winter maintenance service levels.

"Snowplowing must recognize the special circumstances and needs of Northern Ontario," he said.
