balance between having development, not existing taxpayers, paying for growth and at the same time, having competitive development.

On Monday, politicians are expected to endorse last week's general committee decision to recover 75 per cent of the cost \$495,000 of the \$660,000 it will cost to to \$7,500 from \$3,629

Town Council is attempting to find a process development applications this year.

That fee schedule would mean startling increases for some planning fees - the administration fee for final approval of a subdivision/ condominium application would jump 704 per cent to \$2,250 from \$280 and the cost for an Official Plan of development, bringing Town coffers amendment would increase 107 per cent

Only Councillors Jane Fogal and John Day voted against the 75 per cent cost recovery rate, with Fogal arguing they cannot justify having high taxes, high development charges and the highest development fees in the GTA because Halton Hills isn't Nirvana or Hawaii and must be competitive.

Referring to Mayor Gastle's post election claim that Halton Hills is open for

business, Fogal said, "really, it looks more like we're trying to discourage it (growth)."

Mayor Gastle defended the Town's efforts to bring commercial and industrial development to Halton Hills and said, "developers know they have to pay their way," adding they weren't asking for 100 per cent cost recovery.



Construction of new station to cost \$650,000 **By FRANCES NIBLOCK**

A handful of Acton residents who viewed plans for the new Acton ambulance station at a public meeting last Wednesday, liked what they saw.

"This is a positive move for Acton and we welcome this improvement to our neighbourhood," said immediate neighbour Cheryl Beaton who said she likes the "residential" look of the proposed 2,500square-foot-building.

Husband Bill Beaton said Halton quickly answered their concerns about privacy by agreeing to remove a hedge that separates the proposed station and their home and replace it with a fence.

"These two buildings – the ambulance station and fire hall -bring the project to completion and give Acton full emergency services," Bill Beaton said just before a public meeting/ information session at the Acton arena

The proposed \$650,000 facility, one of three being built by Halton to improve land ambulance services, was designed by the same architect who designed the adjacent fire hall to the north.

It will be constructed with the same materials as the fire station - salmon-coloured brick with a green roof – and will be landscaped to look less like an Continued on Page 2
