Injured Workers hold first Milton meeting

Workers injured on the job or having trouble with pensions and funding will get some help.

A meeting has been organized and sponsored by the North Halton Injured Workers Association to deal with the concerns. The meeting will be held Jan. 23 at 7:30. p.m. in the Optimists Centre on Commercial St.

The meeting marks the first in a monthly, rotating series of meetings the association will hold in Milton and Georgetown.

Association spokesman Ted Scott said meetings of the group have been held in Georgetown. But the member-

ship is growing and it was realized moving the meetings around would make it easier for Milton's injured persons to attend.

Mr. Scott told The Champion the coming meeting is designed to give new members insights into the way compensation cases are handled, the ways funding is allocated, and what to do when supplements are cut.

"I won't say we are experts, but most of us have been through the system and we can describe the pitfalls that He ahead of anyone who is injured and is seeking compensation," Mr. Scott said.

Reading for a cause

Recreational reading by Robert Baldwin School students will be turned into an enterprising experience with financial rewards for the Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada. During the next month each student will

have a chance to take part in a read-a-thon voluntary basis. Students from Kindergarten level to Grade 5 will be sponsored to read books with proceeds going to multiple sclerosis research.

He expects this year the donation will increase as more students are involved. The fund raising program was introduced to participants Tuesday, Jan. 15 by a representative of the society.

The MS read-a-thon assembly provided students with information about the disease as well. Multiple sclerosis is a disease of the central nervous system which strikes young adults. More than 35,000 Canadians have the disease which has no known cure and research has not determined its cause.
