Not always like script

An unexpected loss, a win and a come-from-behind tie was exactly the way the script was supposed to read for Milton Remax Realty minor bantams in their recent three outings.

Three wins were the correct wording on the script. However, Dundas spoiled that promptly by taking advantage of their one-man show of excellence - Darcy McEachern - who was responsible for five goals while adding an assist as the valley-towners dumped Remax 7-4.

The third period began with both clubs tied at three but three goals were scored by the Dundas crew before Remax could reply. It was the big difference in the contest making the count 6-4 with McEachern scoring his final marker with just 19 seconds left in the game.

Kyle Hasselfeldt, Stephen Schaffer, Chris LeBlanc and Greg Harris were the marksmen for Remax in a losing cause. Assists went to LeBlanc, Todd McLeod, Shawn Healey, Chris Fabbro (with two), Hasselfeldt, Jason Blanchard and Mark French.

In a penalty-filled contest at home, Remax prevailed in the hockey part of the game as they dominated Brampton 4-1. Todd McLeod was the leader for the winners as he fired two blasts.

There were several great opportunities by both clubs earlier but it was not until just 4:30 remained in the game when either club could dent the twine.

Todd McLeod put Milton on the board at 11:31 on an unassisted blast. Brampton replied 16 seconds later with their only goal. Todd McLeod fired his second rocket at 12:20 with help from Kevin Moffat.

French accepted a Hasselfeldt pass to put Remax ahead 3-1 nine seconds later. With just 25 seconds left in the game, Scott McLeod showed his good shooting with the fourth and final Remax tally.

On Sunday, Burlington's AA club skated into town and four times they scored followed soon afterward by a Remax equalizer. Following a scoreless opening period, Erik Paradis opened the scoring for Burlington with his first of two at 1:16 of the middle frame.

Lee Finch triggered a Scott McLeod offering 44 seconds later to tie the score. Sean Melander, with his first of a pair, put Burlington ahead once more at 4:32.

Hasselfeldt dug the puck out of the corner, passed it back to Todd McLeod who relayed it across to brother Scott McLeod who blasted a box screamer to once more knot the contest at two at the 5:15 mark.

Melander put Burlington ahead for the third time in the game at the 7:44 mark of the middle period. Scott McLeod put Remax right back into things, with help from Shawn Healey, for his second marker of the contest at 5:29 of the final frame.

Paradis poked home the fourth Burlington tally three minutes later and for the next few minutes it looked like Remax was going down to defeat as they were having trouble getting out of their own half.

However, with only 2:35 remaining, Hasselfeldt fed LeBlanc a perfect pass, which this time he made no mistake on giving Remax a hard fought up-hill draw.

With but one game of the regular season remaining, the club's record stands at 11-12-4 for 26 points as they head into Orangeville for their finale.

Beeliners Brampton 2-2 battle

Milton Beeliners hummed back to gain a 2-2 tie against Brampton in novice A hockey action Sunday. John Moffat had put Beeliners on the board with an unassisted goal early on but Brampton tied it soon after and then banged in the go-ahead goal.

The teams coasted through a scoreless second period but Brampton put Beeliners on the spot at 3:57 elapsed of the third. It was a breakaway goal. Milton came back to tie it with just three minutes left in the contest.

"They're not all that great," he said. "But we've had a lot of trouble with guys having to work. It makes it difficult to get the team working together, and that's where the consistency comes from."

Tony Casarin had a good week for Mustangs. He collected 22 points against Georgetown and had 18 in Oakville. The Georgetown contest marked the first time Casarin had earned more than 20 points per game this year. "He's been playing very well both offensively and defensively," Roser pointed out.

Bill Orradetti scored 16 points in Georgetown. Franz Nowak had 12 in Oakville. In Georgetown Mark Brewer picked up a lot of steals.
