

Sad semifinal for Peewees

Milton Optimists minor peewees have suffered from semi-final blues in tournament play this year and a weekend tournament in Fort Erie was no different.

In three tournaments this year, Milton has posted a 7-1-1 record in round-robin play only to be eliminated in the semi-finals with lacklustre efforts.

In Fort Erie, Milton sailed through the round robin with three wins. Milton beat Brampton 5-2, Mississauga Royals 4-2 and Kitchener 4-1 before meeting Pickering in the semi-final.

Although Milton's Ian Ellis scored just 36 seconds into the game with a hard wrist shot from about 30 feet out, it wasn't Milton's day as Pickering roared back a minute later to knot the score and then fired three unanswered second-period tallies to wrap it up. Optis had several good scoring chances in the final period off the sticks of John Cheeseman, Todd Mulley and Mike Cox put their shots either just wide or hit the goalie.

Against Brampton, Milton broke a 1-1 first-period deadlock with a controversial goal from Russell McLean scored with just one second remaining. Second-period goals from Pat Henneberry and Damien Dubien put Milton ahead to stay while Trevor Brandt completed the scoring. Ellis had opened the scoring in the game. Cox had two assists while single helpers went to Gio Piazza, Mulley, Cheeseman and McLean. Ryan Reddick played well in goal as did the defensive quintet of Mike Lee, David McDuffe, Kevin Davidson, Robbie Crowe and Jason May.

Against Mississauga Royals, Cheeseman and Dubien combined on a picture-perfect passing play with 2:27 left in the game to break a 2-2 tie and send Milton to victory. Cheeseman laid out a perfect pass to Dubien in front of the goal and he instantly redirected it into the goal.

Cox fired two goals for Milton with Ellis

adding a goal. Assists went to Brandt with two and Cheeseman and Henneberry with one each. Goalie Peter Downs was steady between the pipes.

Against Kitchener, Piazza showed his former Kitchener teammates a few lessons when he scored the first goal midway through the opening period on a goalmouth scramble with linemates Ellis and McLean assisting. Milton roared in front 4-0 after two periods and were not threatened the rest of the way.

McDuffe, with a nice shot off the face-off, Ellis and Mulley added a goal each. Assists went to McLean with two and singles to Ellis, Henneberry and Cheeseman.

In league play last week, Milton turned the tables on Oakville to get their first win over their south Halton arch-rivals of the year.

McLean broke a 1-1 deadlock with a goal two minutes into the second period with an unassisted effort to set Milton on their way.

Ellis maintained his hot scoring string with a goal while Piazza and McDuffe added one each. Assists went to McLean with two for a three-point night, and Piazza, Ellis and Henneberry with one each.

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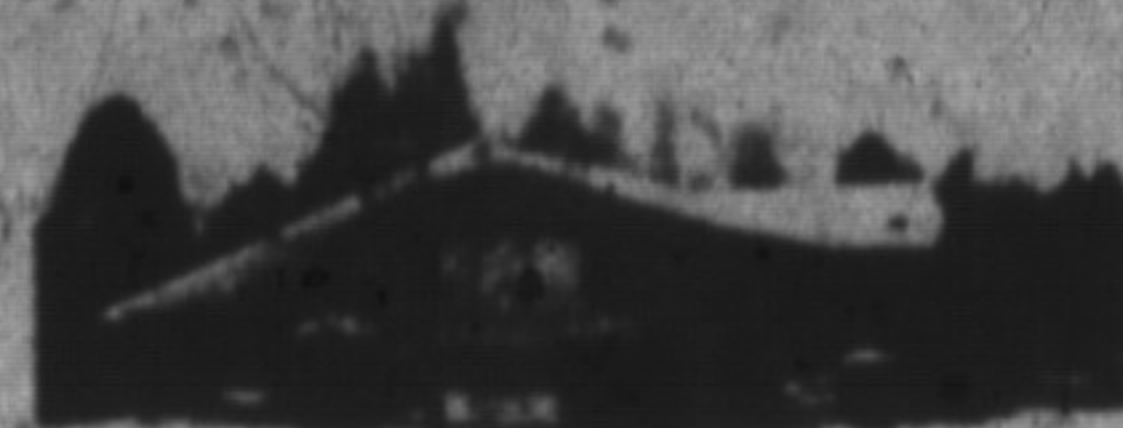
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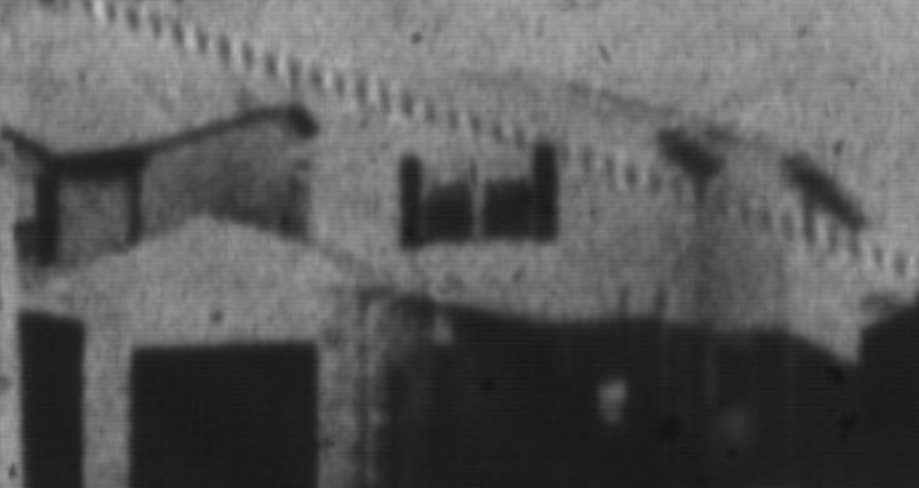


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THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF MILTON

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Milton intends to designate the property, including lands and buildings, at the following municipal address as a property of architectural and historical value under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, 1980, R.S.O. Chapter 337

Municipal Address: 251 Main Street East, Town of Milton (Milton Town Hall)

REASONS FOR THE PROPOSED DESIGNATION:

The existing Milton Town Hall at 251 Main Street East is an example of classic Georgian architecture.

The building was officially opened in 1865 with the First Town Council Meeting in the Building taking place on September 16th, 1867.

Any person may, within thirty days of the first publication of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Milton, notice of his or her objection to the proposed designation together with a statement of the reasons for the objection and all relevant facts. If such a Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Milton shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for a hearing.
