Cost of regional studies at \$2.4 million for 8 years

Halton Region has spent \$2.4 million on studies since 1976.

And although Burlington Mayor Roly Bird makes no apology for the \$7,000 price tag on the inventory of regional studies he requested, Burlington Councillor Walter Mulkewich wonders if the report was worth

the money. Mayor Bird requested a detailed list of the studies Halton has conducted from Jan. 1 1976 to Dec. 31, 1983, including information on whether the study was conducted by regional staff or a consultant, start and completion dates, the status of the studies, gross and net costs and funding sources outside the Region.

The report took 380 staff hours and cost \$7,674.

The results show that during the eightyear period, 132 studies were completed, averaging 16.5 per year. Gross costs for these studies totalled \$3.6 million, with net regional costs at \$2.4 million, or an average of \$18,450 per study.

At last Wednesday's council meeting, Bird said he hopes the report will be a handy reference for past studies, provide a rationale for future studies, and give council as chance to get their minds around the situa-

"I don't make any apology for the \$7,000. cost," Mayor Bird told council. "It was done in-house and it has value."

But Mr. Mulkewich said he fsn't sure whether the money was well-spent. "All it is is a list. There's no financial analysis here," he said, explaining without analysis, council doesn't know if it's a lot of money or not for what was achieved.

He concluded that the report is simply creating work for bureaucrats. MayorsBird said the report was intended

to be a list of the studies, not a financial analysis. The public works department

conducted the most studies, at 64 per cent of the total 132. Planning has conducted 17 per cent, finance nine, the chief administrative office four per cent, social services three, and personnel, business development and health departments one per cent each.

The biggest price tags apply to Halton's numerous solid waste-related issues, including resource recovery, energy from waste, the search for a landfill site in the late '70s, the ongoing environmental assessment into a new landfill site, and interim plans to accommodate Halton's garbage until the elusive new landfill site is chosen.

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
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
