Drunk drivers receive AIDE

If convicted drunk drivers know more about alcohol the chance of them repeating the offence could be decreased.

This is the theory behind an education program which represents the latest weapon in the war against impaired driving. Added to the arsenal of fines, license suspensions and jail terms is a seven-session program called Alcohol Impaired Drivers Education (AIDE)

Although the program received funding from the Ministry of Correctional Services in October, the first class won't begin until Wednesday, Jan. 16. As this is a relatively new direction in dealing with convicted impaired drivers, preliminary footwork has been extensive for program co-ordinator erol Stoveken:

She was hired for six months by ADAPT. an agency which provides counselling for those addicted to drugs or alcohol. AIDE is a sister pro am to ADAPT and although future funding has not been guaranteed, Mrs. Stoveken is optimistic it will continue past the end of March when the grant expires

After finding Halton judges and the crown attorney were open to the idea, Mrs. Stoveken has been a front-row observer dur ing court proceedings involving impaired drivers. Burlington is the first area of Halton to have the program and already eight convicted impaired drivers have enrolled.

Participation is optional as the judge will explain. Those who agree to take part will face a reduced fine and minimum license suspension. First offenders could be fined up to \$2,000 and have their license suspended for from three months to two years.

Optional participation

Before a person consents to take the course, Mrs. Stoveken describes the program. Once a commitment is made, participants must follow through or be prepared to be back in court.

The co-ordinator of the program has been attempting to establish it here for more than a year. She conducted courses for impaired drivers in Massachusetts, a state with a 10-year history in this type of treatment.

"I was relieved to find out there was a precedent for it." she said In neighbouring Peel Region a similar pro-

gram has been in place since 1981 and according to Mrs. Stoveken the recidivism for impaired drivers has decreased as a result. In Alberta, 28,000 people went through a mandatory seven hour program in 1983.

If education programs for convicted impaired drivers become mandatory in Ontario, as Mrs. Stoveken hopes, students would be plentiful. In 1983, more than 830 peoole were convicted of impaired driving in

There is a hitch in this approach which Mrs. Stoveken is experiencing in Burlington already. Several of those convicted in that city are commuters, simply passing through Inless programs are offered in these drivers' home towns, it would be impossible to request they travel many miles to par-

She is already attempting to establish a reciprical agreement with Peel in regard to commuters convicted outside their own

A second snag Mrs. Stoveken has encountered is the tendancy for lawyers to advise clients not to take part in the program. This advice is based on the fact participants. must adhere to a reporting order for 12 months and report to a volunteer probation of ficer during that period. Then there are the drunk drivers themselves who feel they don't have a problem and therefore don't need the program.

A sobering course

It is generally understood that half of firsttime offenders are problem drinkers and up for their third offence are alcoholics. Mrs. Stoveken guesses drivers charged a second time are also likely to have a problem with alcohol abuse

Who would go through the humiliation and expense a second time?" she asks.

She admits someone with a drinking problem may not be able to complete the course or satisfy the requirements of the reporting order. All seven sessions must be attended and participation in classes in necessary. Participants must arrive on time and in a sober state.

Prior to the first session, participants are interviewed by Mrs. Stoveken to provide background information and further describe the program. The course begins with a questionnaire which Mrs. Stoveken predicts will reveal how little the average person knows about alcohol and its effects. As part of the "group building process"

participants will tell the story of their arrests. According to Mrs. Stoveken few convicted impaired drivers actually have done this before requested to during the program.

Short and long-term effects of alcohol use are explored, myths are "exploded" and even the way alcohol products are advertised is covered in the course.

"Hopefully by the end of the program some will realize alcohol has interfered with other aspects of their lives." she said.

Mrs. Stoveken has already referred some of those interviewed for the program to agencies which deal with people with alcoholrelated problems

earlier on intervention is made, the greater a person's chances are," explained Mrs. Stoveken

She realizes educating convicted impaired drivers alone will not solve the problem of drinking and driving. Children must be the target of anti-drunk driving campaigns. The result will be the same as those now being realized through preventative dentistry, according to Mrs. Stoveken.

"It's the same degree of problem as smoking was 20 years ago," she said.

As a member of the Mayor's Community Action Group on Drinking and Driving, Mrs. Stoveken is part of the movement sheparallels with the one which expanded the ranks of non-smokers and the fitness conscious. This group was responsible for a recent display at Milton Mall promoting sober

One of the stumbling blocks marring such campaigns is the existence of lifestyle advertising, according to Mrs. Stoveken. Educating doctors about the physical symptoms of alcohol abuse, expanded drivereducation programs which would cover the effects of drinking and driving and changing attitudes toward the offence are steps which should be taken, she said.

Providing funding for the program is extended, Mrs. Stoveken expects Miltonians will have the option of enrolling in AIDE

beginning in April.


