 MANITOBA AND THE ONTARIO BOUNDARY.

The Legislature of Manitoba has resumed business after a long adjournment for the purpose of awaiting the passage of the Boundaries Extension Bill by the Dominion Parliament. To the westward and northward extension of the Province secured by that bill no one anywhere will object. Manitoba was at the outset made ridiculously small, against the protests of the then Liberal Opposition, and the present Liberal Opposition are in perfect accord with the proposal to let her have all the territory and population she really requires for self-governing purposes. But about the eastern extension granted to Manitoba the Opposition in the House of Commons had something to say, and the whole Province of Ontario has much to object to. The boundary measure bequeaths to Manitoba the Dominion side of the dispute with Ontario, and it remains for the Manitoba Legislature to say whether the contention which the Dominion Government is too cowardly to press for itself shall be taken up and fought out to the bitter end by a Province which has nothing to gain if it wins, and much to lose whether it succeeds or fails.

There are, unfortunately some apologists of the present Ottawa regime in Manitoba who would use to make bad blood between that Province and Ontario over this matter, but we decline to believe that they are in a majority. They are clamouring against Ontario selfishness, and praising the disputed territory. By taking this stand they force to commit the Manitoba Government to a quarrel with our own over the territory covered by the boundary award. We expect to find Mr. Norquay and his colleagues adopt a more common-sense policy. Even if they were prepared to contend for the disputed territory they could not expect to gain anything by acquiring it, for all the timber and minerals, which give it its chief value, would belong to the Dominion, while they would be compelled to provide for the administration of justice over a wide and sparsely settled region. The next few days will probably show what line they are disposed to take. Meanwhile that course is a matter of far greater importance to them than to us. Ontario has over and over again asserted her intention to main-

tain her right to the territory against the Dominion Government, and it is not likely that any action of the Manitoba Legislature will alter her resolution. Our neighbors in the north-west can facilitate a settlement if they please, but cannot postpone it.—*Ex.*

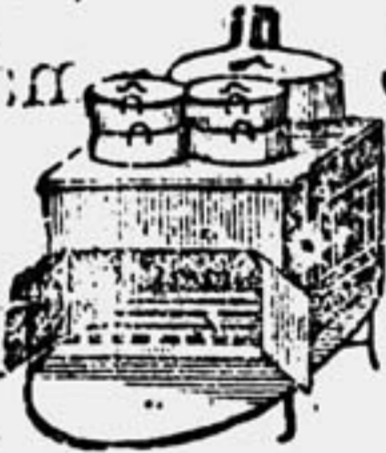
