Coming events cast their shadows before, and the battle-array on the Liquor Law so ominous as to be foreshadowed in these columns last week, has really begun. The first blow struck at the Dominion Liquor Law, so pertinently thrust on this Province, was the appropriation of its best clauses by the Ontario government as amendments to the Cook's Act, and this was done openly. Other telling blows are:

1. License Commissioners must hold an open court, hear evidence for and against applicants.
2. Any ten ratepayers of the sub-polling division may petition against the proposed license and give evidence.
3. A majority of those entitled to vote for a member of Parliament to have power to prevent the issue of any license by their petition.
4. Fines to be more severe. The inspector must prosecute for every breach of the law, even if at the same hearing, the tavern-keeper has been fined.
5. A forfeiture of license for two years, more for a third breach of the law, and much more of the same determined nature.

The schedule of fees fixed by Mr. Mowat on Dominion Licenses is expected to be passed by the House as follows:

Taverns, &c., in cities	\$300
" " in villages	150
" " in townships	120
Transfers	20

The Bill was introduced on the 25th Feb. and is intended to entirely stultify the McCarthy Act. Strange to say this McCarthy Act acknowledges the power of our Provincial government in this matter, agreeable to the 92 Sect. B. N. A. Act, and declares that any person, entitled to a license under the Dominion Act, must first show a receipt of payment of fees levied by the Province, before the Ottawa license can issue.

Temperance men are put in a most difficult position certainly, yet they must keep up heart. If the general public could but be educated by the pulpit, the newspaper, and the pamphlet, with a special Reader in the School (as is already the practice in many parts where practical and energetic temperance workers are), then the brighter day would be sooner come. At the same time the wrong side, the non-temperance parties, will find nothing pleasant in this political muddle.

A painful occurrence took place here on Wednesday. On that day Wm. Bond met John Farrell, when an altercation took place between them. Farrell, with the intention of getting away from his assailant, crossed from the Globe towards the blacksmith shop, followed by Bond who kicked Farrell just above the ankle, breaking his leg. Medical aid being summoned, pronounced the break a very serious one. Much sorrow is felt for the injured man. We don't believe in expressing a sickly sympathy with wrong doers, but in this case we imagine that none would feel more keenly this occurrence than Bond himself after realizing what he had done. At the time of this unfortunate affair Mr. Chinn was at Whitby on business, who is of opinion that had he been at home it would not have taken place.

Some evil disposed person or persons have made a business, during the past few days, of tearing down the bills posted around the village by the Athletic Association announcing their concert. This is not the first case of this kind that we have had our attention drawn to. The matter has been put into the hands of the authorities and we hope to see the guilty parties punished as they deserve.

The Council went into committee of the whole on said by-law, J. R. Mathewson in the chair, and the By-Law was read a second and third time and passed.

J. R. Mathewson, seconded by Wm. Hoar, moves that the Clerk be and is hereby authorized and required to send the minutes of this Council to the two papers printed in the town of Whitby. Carried.

J. R. Mathewson, seconded by Wm Hoar, moves that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay James Sills \$1.75 per week for board furnished to John Burrow's, indigent, until otherwise further ordered. Carried.

The Reeve was authorized by the council to grant his order on the Treasurer in favor of a number of accounts presented at the Council Board amounting to \$227 60

J. R. Mathewson, seconded by Wm Hoar, moves that the Reeve be and is hereby authorized to grant his order on the Treasurer in favor of J. Sinclair, S. Beall, and J. McPherson for \$2.00 each, for their duties as a committee on the Ketchen and Mathewson dispute.

J. R. Mathewson, seconded by W Hoar, moves that J. Cuttill's tender, \$65, for printing be and is hereby accepted. Carried.

Mr Mathewson, seconded by Mr Hoar, moves that John Tweedie be and is hereby appointed commissioner to examine the Bowerman bridge, the Allman bridge, 4th con.; White's bridge, near the tile yard, and Reel's bridge on the Kingston road, and ascertain the length and quantity of timber required to build said bridges, and report to the Reeve as soon as possible.

On Motion of Mr Hoar, seconded by J. R. Mathewson, the council adjourned to meet on the 1st Monday in April at 1 p m
