Potato Culture.

large yield tends to reduce the cost of production. While the average production of this country is probably not much over 100 bushels per acre, 500 bushels per acre can be raised. Aim high!

While potatoes will grow in almost all kinds of soil, the best on the farm is none too good. A rich, sandy loam, naturally well drained, is perhaps the best. Manure will benefit almost any soil, but raw manure should not be so applied as to come in direct contact with the tubers.

Give deep and thorough cultivation. If soil is light and season likely to be dry, plant the sets deep, say four or five inches, using potatoes of fair size, uniform and smooth, cutting in halves or quarters; plant in rows three feet twelve inches in rows. 
