Several families in town have had their hen roosts invaded this week, and their whole flock of hens mysteriously killed. In one case as many as 20 hens were destroyed.

At first it was thought that weasels were at work in the town but it has since been concluded that the killing is the work of dogs. Two or three suspicious curs have been seen wandering around back yards within the last few days and a claim for damages may result if suspicions be confirmed.

Equal Rights meeting.

Hon. J. H. Long took advantage of the presence of the county council this week to call a special meeting of the town Equal Rights at his office on Tuesday evening. Nearly all the county fathers attended, and Mr. Cleavelly, Rama, acted as secretary. President Long stated in assuming the chair that he was in a position to announce that Dalton McCarthy would be the next premier. The great leader would have a large support in the west, and would carry more than half the ridings in Ontario. In Quebec he would make almost a clean sweep, as the Catholic vote was with him to a man, while in the east it was all up with Tupper. This constituency will be hotly contested by supporter of McCarthy, and this meeting will be asked to make its feelings known in the matter. The policy of Mr. McCarthy is unchanged. It is "Down with churches and schools." Let Manitoba raise wheat and drop religion and schools. The clergy has got to be ironed off with shackles. The trade question is all bosh. It is the people's rights we want, and the church is abolishing everybody's rights, and robbing their pockets. One church is just as bad as another. The first business of this meeting would be to pass upon his (Long's) candidature. They would all recall that he was nominated at a meeting held some months ago. Mr. Gould said he was much pleased with the statement of policy as given by Hon. J. H. Long. He could endorse every word of it. The course of this country has been a mistaken one from the start. We have too much party. Heretofore he has supported Mr. Laurier in West Ontario and this campaign he would support the equal rights banner. He moved to endorse Mr. Long as the candidate of the party. Mr. Hoyle seconded the resolution. He said he never felt more worked up than when listening to the able exposition of policy given by the chairman. His (Hoyle's) voice would in future be cast for Equal Rights. He believed that if Sir Charles Tupper rules the roost religion would run rampant, and we would be taxed to pay for it. As to schools, we don't want them at all. Mr. Gerow said it was on an occasion he had longed for to attend one of these meetings. He is for Equal Rights as explained at the chair. He had noticed that the parliament, and were demanding the right to pray there at the opening of each session. Mr. Ham said he had ceased to take any interest in Canadian parties, and had been working for an annexation with the United States, but if Mr. Long runs on the platform of abolishing churches and schools he (Ham) will take the field to support that cause. Mr. Van Woodruff asked if it were not about time to pass round the hat. He had never before seen in one of these meetings this long without pulling the boys' legs with a subscription list. The chairman—Will Mr. Woodruff please keep his mouth shut. Mr. Fred Hatch—We can't run a candidate on wind, Mr. Chairman. The chairman—We can run you out of here on wind if you interrupt this meeting any further. I might just say here that in this contest I intend to pay my own expenses, and nobody will be asked to put up a cent. I have still some money in the bank, and every dollar will be laid out in winning this riding by legitimate means. Mr. Real asked what would be the price of votes? Mr. Real—Did you say votes or oaks? Mr. Real—Votes. The chairman—Well, you know your vote to them that needs votes. How many I will see you later (with a wink). Mr. Hatch—The chairman be so good as to wink at me too. Several gentlemen—Wink at all of us! (Intense interest.) Mr. Weir said if there was anything in this political platform that should cause progressive the abolition of churches and schools but also the assurance of a profitable and healthy way of high prices for votes. (Cheers.) Mr. Woodruff—Long as being not only a good equal rights but a good Tory as well, which met his (Weir's) views candidate. (Sensation.) Mr. R. E. Mowbray protested, and said the feelings of both the candidate and this meeting were outraged by Mr. Weir's cool assumption that a common Tory, (hear!) is still nothing but a common Tory. (Hear!) Several members rose to protest, when the door opened and one Richard Collins, a laboring man, walked in dressed in sordid looking clothes. The chairman at once proceeded to put him out, but others interrupted and directed the chairman's attention to the fact that the intruder had a McCarthy badge on his breast. He was asked to state whom he supported, to which he answered "Sir Chas. Tupper. Great turmoil kicked up in the hall. Mr. Woodruff intervened, during which the McCarthy badge was torn from him and Collins summarily ejected, the chairman stating that the Equal Rights cause did not recognize laboring or poor men of any class. Mr. Woodruff then proceeded to pass round his hat to collect funds, but was stopped by the chairman, who demanded the object. Mr. Woodruff—To buy notes with. The chairman demanded that the money be returned to the gentleman who contributed, and then ordered Mr. Woodruff to get out. During the confusion attendant upon Mr. Woodruff's expulsion Mr. Ogilvie moved the adjournment of the meeting to Friday night, and the motion carried. Cheers for the candidate were given before dispersing.
