Railway fatality

Shortly after the 9.57 p. m. express passed east through the junction here on Sunday night some boys who had been to meet it started west from the station toward the overhead bridge. About fifty yards west of the baseline crossing they noticed the body of a man lying beside the track, the face being bloody. The boys ran to the bridge and reported the matter to some parties who were standing there, and the latter proceeded to the place where the corpse lay, and found that the face was still warm. The body was that of a young man of 18 or 20, and was removed to the freight shed and the authorities notified. It was found that the young man's head had received a heavy bump or stroke on the top, but otherwise there were no marks. When found the body lay easily beside the track the poor boy's cap being still in his hand. He had a fine plain gold ring, a silver chain, pocket book and other things, but only a few cents in money. There was also a certificate showing that he was attending Ontario Business College, Belleville, and some letters from a brother at River John, Nova Scotia. The letter was addressed to D B Gollen, which turned out to be the name of deceased. Attorney Farewell telephoned Belleville college and found that Gollen had gone to Niagara on Friday on an excursion. The unfortunate youth had heard and read so much about Niagara Falls that he went there with a crowd, and had been killed here by some mishap on his way back. The approaching express would still be going at high speed when passing the place where Gollen's body was found. An inquest was organized on Monday morning by Coroner Carson, but after taking some evidence the case was adjourned till Monday, June 30th, at 7 p. m. In the meantime a postmortem was ordered to be made, and the conductor and brakemen on the train will be summoned. The postmortem ordered by the coroner's jury revealed the fact that Gollen's neck was broken, and it is probable that he fell from the car on his head, as there were no marks except on his head. His body was placed in a coffin and buried at St. John's church at the bay.
