Met Monday, June 15. The following reductions in assessment were made: W H Smith \$100; Jas Dundas \$100...

The council met pursuant to adjournment.

A number of bills and accounts were presented and referred to the various standing committees.

S Bray was heard asking for a grant on 4th concession, opposite lots 7, 8 and 9.

Petition was presented asking for grant on the Rosebank sideroad for gravel.

Petition presented from Geo Hood and to others for grant to repair Dixie Hills.

H Ellicott was heard asking for a grant between lots 16 and 17 in the 4th con.

James Percy was heard with reference to a public school chart he was introducing.

Application of T C McAvoy for grant to repair road between lots 8 and 9 in 8th con.

Thos. Madden was heard reporting a bad place on the 5th con road, opp. lot 9.

E Roach was heard complaining that West Hill at Clark's hollow was in bad condition.

Petition presented from Lorne Kester and 10 others for grant to cut down hill on the 7th con road opposite lot 31.

Petition from H Westgate and 13 others for grant of \$75 to gravel road between lot 20 and 21 from Kingston road to base line.

On motion of Mr Poucher, Messrs Colin Philip and S H Stephenson were heard as a deputation from Brougham public library to ask for a grant to assist in purchasing books.

Your standing committee on sheep killed by dogs reported and recommended as follows: J C Taylor, 1 sheep killed by dogs, also one damaged, estimated value \$3.75 each, \$5, said amount being two-thirds sworn value.

On motion of Mr Richards, chairman, report was adopted.

The standing committee on contingencies reported and recommended as follows: D R Beaton, serving notices of appeals, \$5; W J Clark, blanks for court of revision and wire fence blanks \$5.50; James Hubbard, on acc., \$3; assessor attending court of revision 50c.

On motion of Mr Mowbray, chairman, report was adopted.

The standing committee on indents reported and recommended as follows: Chas Lynde, supplies to Jas Rainey from 25th day of February to 6th of May, 9 weeks at \$1 per week, \$9; David Dafoe, support of H Elson from 19th day of May to the 16th day of June, 4 weeks at \$1.25 per week, \$5. All of which is respectfully submitted.

On motion of Mr Hilts, chairman, report was adopted.

The road and bridge committee reported and recommended payment of the following sums: Henry Haight, 31 yds of gravel supplied F Doyle, also 61 yards supplied E H Haight for 3 road divisions at 7 cents per yard, also \$1 for right of way, \$7.44; E Dehart, 11 cedar posts at 10c (Pickering one half) 55c; N Crawford, filling washout on Brock road on 5th con, also repairing bridges in 4th con on Brock road, \$33.

Caleb Forsyth, grading hill on 9th con opposite lot 10, contract of 1895, \$18; Reuben Dawson, building culvert bet. lots 16 and 17 in 9th con, \$3.50; Wm Cowan, work done on sideroad between lots 30 and 31 in B F, \$11.40; J H Connor, grading on Greenwood road according to contract, \$3.25.

We beg to acknowledge a communication from Thos C McAvoy, stating that the sideroad bet lots 8 and 9 in the 8th con is in a bad state of repair, would recommend that the 2nd deputy-reeve inspect the same and make necessary repairs.

We beg to acknowledge the certificate of Harry Ellicott, asking to build a wire fence on the south boundary of 5th con, as he has complied with by-law making application, would recommend that his request be granted; also a certificate from Jas Gilchrist asking to build a wire fence on sideroad bet lots 26 and 27 in 2nd con, as he has complied with by-law in making application would recommend that his request be granted.

Ezra Roach and George Hood were heard before the council concerning Dixie hills and hill west of Forest Mills in 3rd con, would recommend that the 1st deputy-reeve inspect the same and report at the next meeting of this council.

We have before us the certificate of J C Taylor, asking to build a wire fence on sideline between lots 28 and 29 in 2nd con, as he has complied with by-law in making application, would recommend that his request be granted.

Henry Morrison, having made application for bonus on wire fence by-law, but as he has not complied with the specifications mentioned in the by-law, would recommend that his application be laid over until the next meeting of this council.

On motion of Mr. Poucher, chairman, report was adopted.

On motion of Messrs Hilts and Richards the reeve was recommended to grant his order on the treasurer in favor of the parties recommended in the various reports of the standing committees.

Mr Mowbray, seconded by Mr Hilts moves that the thanks of this council be tendered the reeve and members of Scarborough council for the very kind invitation extended to the reeve and members of this council to dine with them on Thursday, June 18th, at the centennial celebration grounds, and that the clerk be instructed to notify the clerk of Scarborough township of the intention of this council to accept said invitation.

Mr Poucher, seconded by Mr Richards, moves that this council do now adjourn to meet again on Monday, Aug. 3rd, at 10 a.m., for the transaction of general business.
