A Reminiscence.

went into the assembly room of our collegiate institute the other afternoon. It was after the pupils and the teachers had left. I am an old ex-pupil of the W. C. I., and I felt more at home with the memories of past school-mates than I would in the company of the present pupils. The janitor and I were alone in the school. He was busily dusting the class rooms, while I reviewed in my memory's eye the days of my sojourn in the old school. I was in the fourth torm when Mr. Tamblyn became principal. well remember how strange and even harsh his methods of teaching seemed in contrast with those of his predecessor. Mr. T. never did for the pupil what the pupil could do for himself; and the pupil who expected to be stuffed with information by his teacher, came, and saw, and went away unstufted, and therefore, dissatisfied. But as time went on, and we became more accustomed to his manner and methods, we felt convinced that he was in the right in all his efforts. I am now on the margin of graduation at the university, and I am pleased to attribute much of my success in study to the principles of self-help inculcated by Mr. Tamblyn. I fancy that my testimony might be greatly augmented by that of hundreds of this teacher's old pupils. If I were asked what characteristic of the successful teacher does Mr. Tambly n specially possess, I would say that he always has the interests of his pupils at heart. He is in perfect sympathy with their aims, and does not spare himself in aiding them to achieve their ambitions. This sympathy is at the basis of all successful teaching. I could mention numerous

above the scheduled time, in order to aid some aspiring pupil. In the year 1892, he worked early and late in the interests of a pupil who should have been at the universty, but who unfortunately was com; elled to take his year outside the sacred precincts of Varsity halls. This is but an isolated instance that might be multiplied ten-fold. Looking over the emblazoned names upon the honor rolls, I worked out the following facts. Since the coming of Mr. Tamblyn to our school seven years ago or more, 143 pupils have received teachers' certificates and university standing. - This does not include the number of drawing and commercial certificates obtained. Twenty-nine pupils have received university standing; of these two received scholarships at matriculation one was first in general proficiency, the other was a scholarship-man in both classics and moderns. Two have obtained first-class honors on entering the university. Three pupils took their first year in our school certificates taken was six.
