Agnew murder

The Agnew murder case came up before His Honor Judge Street at the assizes here last week. Mr. John King, O. C., for the crown, and Barron & Steers for the prisoner John Kearney. The defence brought in a plea of insanity. Other than this the evidence contained nothing new from that which was published in The Warden some months ago. After all the evidence was given and the usual addresses made to the jury, the jurymen retired and within two hours returned with the verdict of guilty. Judge Street gave sentence to the effect that Kearney should be hanged on the 1st of October. The case against Pat Kearney fell through.

It is reported that a number of wealthy Americans, who have been visiting at the Point every season for years past, and were struck with the natural beauty of the place, are negotiating with Mr. Wm. H. Simpson for the purchase of the Sturgeon Point property. If a sale is effected no doubt a handsome summer hotel will be erected at once. This is just what Lindsay would like to see.

Early Sunday morning the residence of Mr. E. Armitage, merchant tailor, who resides on Sussex-st., north ward, was entered by some bad bod burglar. Happily the noise awakened Mrs. Armitage and she aroused her husband, who armed himself with a loaded revolver and a pair of trousers and proceeded to investigate. On reaching the foot of the stairs he found that his early morning caller had levanted without even leaving his address. In his hurried exit doors and windows were left open. Mr. Armitage is now enquiring the price of burglar proof safes.

A very painful accident occurred at Rathburn's mill Tuesday. An employee named Albert Duffy fell on a circular saw, which was in the gummer, inflicting a severe gash on the side of his face about two inches on the eye, extending down to the chin, the cheek being laid open. He also received a severe cut about an inch and a half long on the left shoulder. Dr. Poole was summoned and dressed the wounds. The injured man is doing as well as can be expected from the serious nature of his wounds, but he will carry the scars for some time.

The fire at Fenelon Falls. Friday night about 8.15 fire was discovered in Howry & Sons' lumber yard No. 1. Assistance was immediately asked for from Lindsay, Peterboro, Bocabeygon and Port Hope. The local fire company turned out and together with the pump in the saw mill the flames were prevented from coming back and destroying the planing mill and box factory, saving about 2,000,000 feet of lumber in yard No. 1; burning between 120,000 and 130,000,000. The loss is estimated at \$220,000 to \$240,000, fully insured. The bucket brigade, together with the assistance of the Lindsay and Peterboro teams, prevented the fire from extending to yards Nos. 2 and 3. There was a slight easterly wind, which assisted the local fire company in preventing the burning of the entire plant. There were several small cars and two

He being unable to swim did not struggle very long before filling with water. Those who were present say that he never rose after going beneath the surface. The body was located after being 1 1/2 hours in the water, when all attempts at resuscitation were of no avail. Deceased was a young man of regular habits, and of an industrious nature, and was nearly nineteen years of age. The fatal spot is the first bend below or south of the big iron bridge. The bereaved parents as well as the sister and two brothers have the sympathy of all in their sad and very sudden bereavement. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon when the remains were interred at the Methodist cemetery, Highland Creek.
