Tested by a cow.

A somnambulist's accident.

A very serious accident occurred on Sunday morning by which Mr. A. J. Kilbourn, a respected citizen of Collingwood, who has been in town for some days on a visit to his brother-in-law, Mr. G. A. Chase, received terrible injuries. Some years ago Mr. Kilbourn was troubled with somnambulism, but seemed to have recovered from it. On Sunday morning about one o'clock, however, he arose in his sleep and walked out of the window on to the verandah of Mr. Chase's residence, falling heavily to the ground. Drs. Harvie were summoned and his injuries were such that an anaesthetic was required in dressing the wounds. The arm was badly shattered. The radial bone was broken in three places, the ulnar bone dislocated at the wrist, and protruding, causing considerable loss of blood; the humerus also fractured in three places. Every care and attention was shown to the sufferer, who is about fifty years of age, and he is progressing fairly well. His brother arrived in town on Monday and remained with him until Tuesday, when he was able to be taken to his home in Collingwood. —News-Letter.

The busy burglar.

Residents of Orillia who are spending the summer in cottages on the lake shore and elsewhere, require to adopt proper precautions in regard to securing their town residences while they are away. Last week Mr. E. B. Alport, who with his family is living at Invermar, entered his Peter St. residence one morning, found the back door open and everything in confusion. An examination revealed the fact that burglars had cut out a light of glass in a back window, had entered and ransacked the house, carrying off several small sums of money, all the table silver, and such other articles of value as were easily removed. Mr. Alport's loss, although heavy, is all the more aggravating because several of the stolen articles were heirlooms or gifts around which clustered many tender associations. On Monday Mr. T. H. Sheppard made the discovery that the cellar of his house had been gone through, and fruit and groceries to the value of \$75 abstracted. The family are living in their summer cottage on Cedar Island, and these goods had just been purchased and placed there prior to being taken over to the island. Detectives are after the culprits, and it is hoped that before long they will be brought to justice. In the meantime secure your premises, or don't leave them entirely alone. —Times.

Farm Notes.

A greater variety of crops can be grown and we are surer of a good catch of clover on a well drained soil, and it is not so apt to be thrown out with the frost in winter and spring.

In selecting seed potatoes for the coming planting, choose the varieties for the several plantings which you know to have given good results. Don't be too anxious to run after what you have only heard about. New varieties have generally been produced under very favorable, and sometimes special circumstances, which you cannot afford to repeat.

Regarding the tanning of skins without removing the hair, a very good way is to stretch the skin tightly upon a board with hair side down. Scrape off loose flesh and fat with a dull knife and apply chalk freely, rubbing it in thoroughly. When chalk begins to powder and fall off, remove skin from board and rub in plenty of powdered alum. Wrap it up closely and keep in a dry place for a few days. It will be found nice and pliable. Another method is to mix saltpetre and alum, two parts of the former to one of the latter, and sprinkle it uniformly over the flesh side of the skin. Then roll up and lay away in a cool place for a few days. Then spread it out to dry and scrape off the fat. It will have to be rubbed vigorously to render it pliable.

Farmers usually have a plentiful supply of fresh meat in winter when the weather is cold, and by freezing the meat can be kept sometimes for weeks without being injured. But in summer it is different, and the ration of salted pork or corned beef is apt to become tiresome. It is a surprise that some of the fresh meat butchered in winter is not canned, as it may easily be. Cut it in small pieces without any bone, and cook so thoroughly as to expel all air. Then place it quickly in glass jars that have been slowly heated until they are nearly as hot as the cooked food. If this is done and the cans are immersed, except the tops, in hot water, the glass will not break. Pack the meat as closely as possible in the can, and when filled cover the top with melted lard and seal the can. The lard will protect the meat beneath it from any air that may be under the lid of the can and which may have ferment germs. A few cans of fresh meat for use in summer will be quite as convenient as the cans of fruit and vegetables which all good housewives now put up every summer and fall in greatest abundance. Fresh fruit in the summer is more easy to get in the country than is fresh meat of any kind.
