Mr. Henry, seconded by Mr. Stocks, moved that the reeve grant his order on the treasurer for \$25 in favor of the corporation of Oshawa for services of fire engine at Cedar Dale fire—Carried.  
Mr. Grierson, seconded by Mr. Guy, moved that the reeve, clerk and mover be appointed a committee to meet the commissioners appointed to divide the county into divisions for county purposes to look after the interests of this township—Carried.  
Mr. Grierson gave notice that at the next meeting of this council he will move for leave to introduce a by-law to amend the by-law appointing constable for Cedar Dale.

**A Live Willow Fence.**  
A willow stake pushed into the soil in early spring, while it is yet moist from the effects of winter freezing and thawing, will almost certainly grow, and after two or three years it will become enough of a tree to serve as a post for attaching wire to it for a fence. We have known many farmers who construct their roadside fences in this way, often planting the trees close enough together so that a 14 or 16-foot board may be nailed to the living posts after they have attained sufficient size. By cutting off the top every two or three years the fence may be kept from shading the road or field too much.
