Harnet Beecher Stowe's Last Letter.
The last thing written by Mrs. Harriet Beecher Stowe, only a few days before her death, was a loving acknowledgment to the public for the remembrances and tokens and expressions of affection which she sent on her 85th birthday, which she sent to the Ladies' Home Journal. In the next issue of this magazine it will be published in facsimile. It reflects the beautiful nature of the gifted authoress, and by her death has become her last message to the American public.
The Earthquake.
The severest shock of earthquake known to have visited this part of the country in years occurred between 5 and 10 minutes to Monday morning. Hundreds of townspeople report having been awakened, while not a few who were awake give accurate accounts of the phenomena. The sound was most like that of distant but very heavy thunder, and lasted probably 20 seconds. After about one-third of the shock had passed, up to which time the roll of sound had been extremely even, there came a tremendous thump. From then on until lost to sensation, the sound was a rolling thunderous sound which had characterized its commencement was resumed, and gradually declining died away on the hearing. Townspeople and those living in the country immediately to the north are pretty well agreed that the shock passed further to the north across the country, but in which direction it travelled could not certainly be determined, although the preponderance of opinion is that it was towards the northwest and came from the east or northeast. Houses were shaken, windows rattled, dishes moved, and in some instances it is stated that furniture tottered. The sky was slightly clouded at the time, but the stars shone brightly where not obscured by the clouds. The air was very still, and the atmosphere might be said to have been hot and close; no thunderstorm preceded the earthquake, nor followed until between 8 and 9 o'clock that morning, so that there was no mistaking the nature of the unusual disturbance. But in the course of a few hours the commotion resulted in a fine morning shower. Later reports show that the rumbling was heard and felt northwest of here in a course running north of Oshawa in the direction of Taunton.

Re-Count of North Ontario vote.
Before His Honor Judge Burnham a re-count of the North Ontario vote took place here yesterday. Mr. D'Alton McCarthy, Q. C., represented Warden D. Graham, and Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, Q. C., acted in behalf of Candidate John A. McGillivray. The proceedings were held in private and we are not in a position to report a great deal about it. Reports coming out during the day were unimportant, until in the evening the astonishing revelation was made that the ballots were found to have been tampered with since they had been sealed up on the night of the election. It appears that the returning officer, Mr. Thos. Taylor, Cannington, has kept the whole election returns under lock and key in a room in his house, but upon opening the sealed packets it was found that ballots marked for McGillivray were in several cases placed in Graham's parcel, while the opposite only occurred once. Mr. McGillivray believes that this is either the work of an enemy of his or a fool friend. If any person who had access to the ballots had desired to spoil Graham's votes he could have done it in many effective ways, whereas this stealing of ballots and substituting of others was too manifest a fraud. Mr. Graham appeared very much inclined to blame the returning officer for the trouble, and feels very much the loss of the seat after fairly winning it. It now looks as if another vote would have to be taken to elect a member for North Ontario, and Mr. McGillivray is reported as saying he will not stand again as he wishes to retain his position as supreme secretary of the Foresters. It looks well to see all parties to the re-count equally outspoken in condemning these frauds, and stamping them all as honorable men.

Senator Price's crop report.
Senator Price and Auctioneer Charles Scott have been making a trip through Base Line, Pickering, Dunbarton, Brougham, Greenwood, Audley, Brooklin, Ashburn, Myrtle, Utica, Epsom, Taunton, Oshawa and various other places, and find the crop very good, with the exception of hay, which is light except in a few places. Peas are very fine, barley good, oats good, fall wheat fair. The best piece of long straw peas is on the farms of Jas. Bryant, Pickering, and R. Sinclair, base line early peas, Thos. Pindar, base line; short straw peas, James Leask, Taunton; white marrowfat, Wm. M. Reel, Greenbank; blackeyes, Henry Bickle, Brooklin; mummy peas, Matthew Murphy, Whitby; barley, John Greenlaw, Pickering; oats, Wm. Westlake, 4th con.; flax, David Brown, base line; brood of chickens, Wm. Westlake, Dunbarton; geese, Wm. Baile, 4th con.; ducks, Wm. Bailey, Whitby; field of mustard, Harry Cochran, Oshawa; field garden, John Thompson, 2nd con.; 5 best heifers, yearling grade, J. H. Law, Whitby; fall rye, Jas. Dwyer, Greenwood; rye, large crop and most of it good except in Pickering, where it is a complete failure owing probably to the dry weather or the prohibitory winds; fall wheat, John Dryden, Brooklin.

Pickering Local Option Cases.
In December, 1895, James Gordon, Pickering, John M. Germond, Brougham, and Alexander Wilson, Claremont, were tried before Police Magistrate Harper of this town on charges of selling liquor without license. The local option by-law had previously been passed in that township, but as its validity was under question before the courts they asked that sentence be withheld in their cases until it would be decided that the by-law was valid. Thus for two years and seven months the police magistrate has been adjourning the case from week to week, until the scroll of each case makes a large roll. Recently the Queen's privy council passed judgment declaring local option valid, and the summons to appear for sentence was issued to each of the defendants, the date being set for Friday last at 3 p.m. J. E. Farewell, Q. C., represented the license inspectors, and some young limb of the law from Toronto spoke for the convicted landlords. On their behalf he asked an adjournment for three weeks. By that time they expected that Sir Oliver Mowat would be replaced by Hon. Mr. Hardy, from whom they hoped to receive sympathy and have their fines forgiven. Delay, he said, would also serve another purpose, he said, in view of petitions being circulated to have local option repealed as being unworkable. If the magistrate were to fine them now people would not believe this and would refuse to sign. Mr. Farewell objected to further delay. The defendants had been allowed to sell liquor without license for years, and were now entitled to pay their penalties. Inspector Ferguson also urged the magistrate to act, as instructions had been given to enforce the law. His worship said the defendants were simply asking the court to assist them in their campaign for repeal, but to the astonishment of everybody he granted two weeks' delay, whereupon Inspector Ferguson rose and left the court in disgust, characterizing the proceedings as a farce. The solicitor for the defence urged that they be allowed more than two weeks' delay, and was refused, but his worship afterwards said he would not say that the fine would be collected promptly.
