The funeral of the deceased took place on Monday at Uxbridge cemetery, the members of the Board of Education attended in a body. Service was held at the house by the Rev. Mr. Reid of St. Paul's church.

Met on July 4th at Sunderland, members all present.
Communication from the following parties were read: John E. Farwell, county clerk, stating that the county tax of Brock township for 1896 is \$2,866.20; also acknowledging receipt of assessment roll.
From the clerk of Thorah stating that the township of Thorah had made a grant of \$20 on the township between Brock and Thorah, on condition that Brock would make a like grant.
The business of the meeting consisted principally of paying accounts, mostly for gravel. \$41 was paid to Anson Walton, \$4 to Thos Benbury, and \$3.88 to Matthew Neason for sheep killed by dogs. \$90 was paid for gravel. The following parties were placed on the indigent list for six months from July 1st, and to receive the sum set opposite to their respective names: Susie Bryson, \$6 per month; Mrs. Wm. Moore, \$2.50 per month; Mrs. George Switzer, \$2 per month; Mrs. O'Grady, \$4 per month; Mrs. Jane Smith, \$3 per month; Yeoman Burke, \$5 per month; Chas. Whiteside, \$3.50 per month; Mrs. David Irvin, \$2 per month; Mary McDougall, \$3.

Met July 6th, members all present. The following communications were read: From the inspector acknowledging receipt of the return of births, marriages and deaths for the half year ending June 30th; From license inspector enclosing \$110.50 being amount of first distribution for the year; From J. E. Farwell, Esq., county clerk, stating that the commissioners appointed to divide county into county council districts will require for their information the assessment rolls, etc., of Reach for 1897; From Judges Dean and Benson asking the council to fill schedule submitted re division of the county into county council districts, and that the commissioners will meet at the court house, Whitty to divide the county into said districts. The reeve was appointed to attend the commissioners at Whitty. Notice was given that at the next meeting of the council a by-law would be introduced to give the Huron and Ontario Electric Railway right of way over certain portions of the highway of Reach.
The following accounts were ordered to be paid: Mr. Weir, \$10.10; Mr. Jos Baird, \$20; Mr. John McClinton, \$15; Mr. Jno Armstrong, \$18.85; Newton Bros, \$4; Mr. Jas Moon, \$2; Mr. Elias Williams, \$2.50; Mr. Ralph McIntyre, \$6; Mr. Isaac Clemens, \$10; Mr. Geo Cox, \$6; Mr. Jno O'Boyle, \$5.60; Messrs R & G Corner, \$7.30; Mr. Wm Smith, 75c.
A further grant of \$10 was given to road division \$8 and \$22 to Reach and Brock townships.

The clerk was authorized to notify the Scugog Game Preserve Co. that at the January session of this council a resolution will be submitted concerning the agreement between said company and this corporation, and to repeal the by-law re said agreement.
A deputation came before the council advocating the passing of a by law limiting the number of taverns in Reach to two, and also intimating that all candidates for municipal honors in 1897 would be asked to pledge themselves to support the proposed reduction. No action was taken. The council then adjourned.
