



Scarboro Mystery.

Saturday evening the badly decomposed body of a man was found in Levi Annis' field, just to the south of the Master Wilbert Powers is ill, with Kingston road, and not many yards east of the Washington church. The man was fairly well dressed and clean shaven, His feet were fast in the fence, and there was a terrible bruise on the back of his head. In his pockets were found papers from which it was learned that his name was James Grass, of Frankford. Dr. Sisley, coroner, was notified, but deemed an inquest unnecessary, as there was no apparent indications to warrent the idea of foul play. The body was prepared by undertaker Hunter and buried in the Washington cemetery.

Newspapers containing reports of the sad affair were seen by R. Grass, an extensive contractor, of Trenton, who conceived the idea that the unfortunate was his nephew, and reached Scarboro Monday night, when the body was exhumed and promptly identified. The remains were enclosed in a metalic casket and

conveyed east by the uncle. The man's sad story is briefly this Gilbert Grass was the only child of a well to do farmer of Frankford. He was always well supplied with money, and from childhood whatever he wanted he received. For some years he helped his father on his farm, but later became a clerk in a dry goods store. When about 17 years of age he fell into the company of some young fellows older than himself who were given to frequenting too often the neighboring taverns, and he gradually developed drinking habits, which gained the upper hand.

Owing to the hard times and the depreciation of farm property the elder Grass had of late to curtail expenses and things did not go as smoothly as before. On the day after the election the father had to go to a neighboring village on business and asked his son to look after the place during his absence. Young Grass, unfortunately, got inebriated and on his father's return a row ensued. When the words were over the youth, for he was only 26 years of age asked for some money and a horse to go to Belleproved, never returned to it alive.


