Volosko has a record of 2 1/4 with little training, and is now in the hands of trainer Jim Noble, at Dufferin Driving Park, Toronto. Volosko bids fair to reduce his record by at least three seconds before the season is over. He is a big powerful bay, of nearly 16 hands and has more action than we have ever seen in a trotter. From his breeding, his individuality and his record, he should prove undoubtedly the best trotting or carriage sire in Canada to-day.

The regular meeting of Reoch council was held on Monday last, 10th inst. Members all present.

### Reoch Council.

The minutes of the July meeting were read and confirmed.

The clerk read a number of communications.

One from the County Clerk acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the assessment roll for Reoch for 1896.

From the County Treasurer stating that the amount due Reoch on account of non-resident taxes for the year is \$62.31.

Mr. Weir introduced and carried through a by-law authorizing the granting of a bonus of 1 1/2 cents per rod for the erection and maintenance of wire fences built along the high-ways of the corporation in localities to be designated by the council.

Mr. Real introduced and carried through a by-law to levy and collect in the several school sections the following amounts as required by the respective Boards of Trustees:—Section No. 1, \$594; No. 2, \$404; No. 3, \$452; No. 4, \$481; No. 5, \$468; No. 9, \$559; No. 5, \$460; No. 9, \$559; No. 11, \$510; No. 12, \$896; No. 16, \$466; No. 17, \$375; No. 19, \$460.

The trustees of Sections Nos. 6, 7, 10, 13, 14 and 15, failed to file the applications with the Clerk in time to have the amounts they require incorporated in the by-law.

Mr. Stephens introduced and carried through a by-law to levy and collect as a special rate for the schools of the municipality the sum of \$2680.

Mr. Stevens introduced and carried through a by-law to assess and collect for indigent aid the sum of \$817.14.

Mr. Lamb introduced and carried through a by-law to levy and collect for county purposes the sum of \$2745.11.

Mr. Weir introduced and carried through a by-law to levy and collect for the general purposes of the township the sum of \$2030.55.

A deputation consisting of Dr. Park of Saintfield, and Mr. Jas. Miller of Greenbank came before the council, and strongly advocated a reduction of tavern licenses in the township for 1897.

Mr. Real introduced a by-law to fix the number of tavern licenses to be issued for the year 1897. The bylaw was read a first and second time and the council was resolved into committee of the whole thereon. In committee the blank for the number of licenses was filled with the word "two," and the committee rose and reported the by-law with the blank filled up.

On motion the report was received and adopted.

On motion for the third reading of the by-law, Mr. Weir moved in amendment that the by-law be not now read a third time but that it be referred back to the committee of the whole with instructions to amend the same by striking out the word "two" defining the number of tavern licenses to be granted and inserting the word "four" in place thereof.

On the amendment being put the yeas and nays were demanded. Yeas—Weir and Lamb; Nays, all the rest.

The by-law was then read a third time and passed.

Mr. Weir introduced and carried through a by-law granting the Huron & Ontario (Electric) Railway Company running powers over certain of the highways of the municipality of Reoch on certain conditions.

On motion of Mr. Weir, \$5 was ordered to be paid Mrs. O'Neil for attendance on one D. Downey, a sick indigent.
