During the past navigation of the lower river is positively dangerous owing to the steamers grazing the bottom at many points. Yesterday (Thursday) the level dropped still lower, and the Crandella while endeavoring the lock last evening to proceed to Port Perry for an excursion, stuck fast on a rock below the bridge for over an hour, and when she finally entered the lock found that there was not sufficient water to float her through, being aground at the stern."
