A beautiful new Canadian flag was hoisted over the collegiate institute on Tuesday morning by caretaker John Baker, and two new masters were on hand to take up their duties. Principal Waugh was on hand and rang the bells himself at 5 minutes to 9, which caused many people of school age to conclude that business will commence promptly at the appointed hour, if not sooner. The attendance of pupils in the assembly room, and the whole reconstructed staff was present. Dr. McGillivray said he came expressly to welcome the new masters. He recalled the many names of brilliant masters who have preceded. Principal Waugh in this institute, and prophesied that the latter would make as good a mark. He assured the staff of the full and active assistance of the board and the raterayers of the town. Messrs. Graham, Bewell, Richardson, Jones, Henderson, Hogarth, Dent and others gave shore addresses. The first second, and third forms are more than filled already, and prospects point to the largest attendance for years.

A very sad Accident.  
A most distressing occurrence happened here on Monday. The noon train was coming down from the north at 12:30, and when it turned the curve at the round house the driver noticed a little child on the track at the cowbridge north of Mary street. He clapped on the air brakes, and screamed the whistle for the brakeman to do likewise. As a result the train was held up very quickly, but not until the locomotive had passed over the child, cutting off one of its legs below the knee, and tearing away the flesh to the thigh. The poor little sufferer proved to be the two-year-old child of Brakesman Greenbury, and doubtless it was making its way to the round house to meet its father when the train would come in. It was a sight that melted the hearts of all who saw it to see the mutilated babe in its suffering condition. Drs. Eastwood and Bogart were called, and found it necessary to amputate the leg between the thigh and the knee.

A Melancholy Death.  
Wm. J. Jewell, aged 23 years, son of James Jewell, tenant on Mr. E. W. Wilcox's farm, east of this town, has been in poor health all summer, and recently went to Toronto to take in one of the harvest excursions to the northwest. He consulted a doctor at Toronto and was ordered to return home here, and medicine was provided for him to take. The young man came back very despondent, and on Tuesday decided to go down to the lake shooting. He came down to town and procured ammunition, and went south from his father's residence. He did not return on Tuesday night, and on Wednesday morning his father went south to see what had become of him. Down in the ravine south of the house he found the young man's body lying dead. It was evident that despondency and bad health had resulted in temporary aberration, and the poor young fellow had taken his own life with the gun. Coroner Carson was summoned, and after learning all the particulars of the case decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The young man's body was interred at the union cemetery yesterday afternoon.
