Almost every tree has taken upon itself the shape of an umbrella, so heavy does the fruit hang, and so great is the weight that Mr. Mentz after exhausting all other supports about the farm, had to break down fifty rods of rail fence and use the rails for support. Mr. Mentz estimates his apple crop at something over 4000 barrels, but a pleasing feature in addition to this is that the fruit buds of next year's crop are already visible and promise a crop equally as large.—Lindsay Watchman.
