Political Notes

There seems to be now no doubt that Mr. Sifton will be Minister of the Interior. The government fears that Joe Martin would be too hard a man to manage.—Hon. E. J. Gibson, Provincial Secretary, is credited with an intention to start a system of Provincial auditing of municipal accounts. If he does some awful bungles and robberies will be unearthed.—The Dominion parliament was prorogued on Tuesday, and will not meet again till February.—Yesterday's papers announced that Hon. T. M. Daly, resigned his seat in the Manitoba legislature and turned it over to Hon. T. M. Daly, Con. Sir Charles and Lady Grey celebrated their golden wedding at Ottawa yesterday.—Lord Rosebery has resigned the leadership of the British Liberals.—Lord and Lady Aberdeen have gone to British Columbia.—The C. P. R. strike has been settled on a basis favorable to the strikers.

Ontario & Durham Exhibition.

We regret, and we have no doubt, so does every one who has ever attended the Ontario & Durham exhibition, that the directors find themselves, after several years of unceasing and unselfish labor, heavily in debt. A more honorable or a more intelligent and businesslike body of men than the directors of the above association will be difficult to find, and it is really crying shame that their best efforts have received such slight recognition from the yeomen and wealthy county. A country fair is an immense benefit to every class of the community, and we make bold to say that it does more to stimulate and encourage, friendly rivalry and keen competition, every branch of human industry than any other institution or association in existence. We think it the duty of the county commissioners of this rich agricultural district to see to it that this district prospers, and is not closed. A liberal grant from the county, supported by private subscriptions, would preserve for us an institution that has done more to advance the interest of the community than it is possible to estimate.

Short Notes.

Under the new system of electing county councilors it will be possible for those in favor of a county house of refuge to elect one of the two representatives of the county council district, provided those favoring a house of refuge comprise more than one-third of the electors of said district. All they have to do is for each voter to poll two votes for the candidate of his choice, and that ensures his election.

Election matters are waxing very hot in the United States, as three weeks from next Tuesday, (Nov. 3rd), will be polling day in the presidential campaign. All the members of congress, about twenty-five of the governors of states, the same number of state legislatures, and municipal officials by the thousand, will also be elected on that day. Just now every trick that can be resorted to is being indulged in to capture voters. Last Saturday's Chicago Dispatch, which is the only Chicago paper of note supporting Bryan, announces in flaming type that England is threatening war if the free silver platform carries, the object being to win ignorant and British hating people to vote for Bryan. Speech-making is the order of the day from one end of the land to the other, and the widest possibilities of the silver scheme are being exploited by the orators of both sides to rave about. The American nation has pretty nearly lost its head over an insane scheme, and we will now see whether our cousins possess the faculty of self-government which they boast so much about.

Few people have any idea of the importance of the great strike of operators along the C. P. R. The authorities declare to the public daily that things are running all right, but travellers are beginning to reach here who say that the whole railway is practically useless as matters stand. In many places along the main line passenger trains travel with hand cars ahead to flag them, which means less than ten miles per hour. Other trains carry an operator who goes into each station as they arrive and communicates with the next station by commercial wire while the train waits. Hundreds of cattle in transit have starved to death, and immense quantities of perishable goods have wasted. The company will have to pay all damages accruing whilst freight is in their hands, and between this and loss of business millions will be sunk. The operators are drawing no pay, and other trainmen are not in a position to earn any until trains may be run. The public inconvenience is beyond estimation, and altogether the strike is a sort of national disaster.

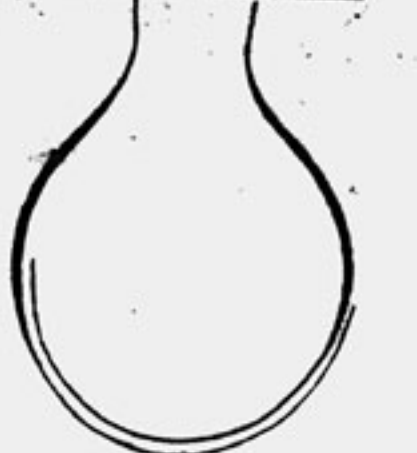
