Is Autumn Topdressing Wasteful.

There is no waste in spreading fresh mapure or that not composted on grass lands in the autumn of the year unless they are liable to be flooded. In the first place, the fresh manure has no ready available nitrogen to be wasted in any way. Its soluble portions will be washed by rains in among the grass roots, and when spring comes, warming the soil, this manure will decompose in contact with it, and be in the best position to. help the grass crop. There is usually on grass land no wasteage of rain water through the soil until spring, and with no available nitrogen in the soil none can be washed away. It is different, however, with well-rotted manure. That i largely available nitrogen, and we should not like to put that in the autumn even on grass land. English experiments show considerable losses of nitrogen in analyses of water from underdrains where the land above was autumn manured with nitrate send by return mail in plain. sealed of soda.
