Understand that considerable about the Fitch perjury of which is erroneous, we public interest endeavor to and as correct a statement as we can. In connection libel case Fitch vs. Malloy, was on June 30th last examination before Deputy Examiner Perry, in Toronto, and on account of the alleged falsity of some of his answers an information was subsequently laid against him for perjury. The adjourned case came up before Judge McDougall on Tuesday afternoon last in his chambers, Toronto. It will be noted that at his examination for discovery under oath Mr. Fitch denied all knowledge of having unsatisfied judgments standing on record against him in the Paris Division Court, denied owing a dollar to the parties holding such judgments, and denied ever being served with a summons in connection with them. At the trial on Tuesday several witnesses were examined who testified that through their solicitors they had sued him and understood judgments were obtained in said court and that these judgments were still unpaid. Mr Campbell, manager of the Canada Paper Co, swore that Mr. Fitch at the time of said examination owed them about \$100 on a judgment which he understood was obtained in the Paris court and the firm's solicitor, Mr Fleury, swore that it had been paid to him since the said June 30th last for the company by checks from Mr. Fitch and Messrs. Macdonald & Fitch, although Mr Fitch at his examination on said 30th of June swore that he did not owe the Canada Paper Co a dollar. The clerk and bailiff of the Paris Court, through some misunderstanding, failed to be present as witnesses, but the crown was in possession of an affidavit of the clerk in which he states that a number of unsatisfied judgments were then on record in the court against Mr Fitch, and that he examined the affidavits of the bailiff and found that Mr. Fitch was served personally in every case, save one. Owing to the absence of these two important witnesses the Crown was moving for an adjournment when Mr.

Riddell, counsel for Mr. Fitch, offered the following objections. It having been proved that Deputy Examiner Perry after administering the oath to Mr. Fitch, did not remain in the room during the whole time of the examination, he contended that the examination was not held before the examiner and cited an English case in support of his contention. His Honor agreed with Mr. Riddell and decided that on evidence taken thus irregularly a charge of perjury could not be sustained, and discharged Mr. Fitch. This decision is of much interest to the legal fraternity as we understand that evidence similarly been taken by other speculators and that this irregularity prevailed for some length of time.
