Robb, nephews of deceased, where the subject of our sketch continued to reside until the death of his brother George in 1879. After this he spent part of the time at Mrs. D. Mathison's and the balance at the old homestead. Mr. Ogston was a gentleman of quiet and retiring tory and science.
