Will appeal.
We are informed that that in the case of Alma Dale and Thomas Parkinson vs. The People's Loan and Deposit Co., Mr. Henry Jones, who is the real defendant in this case, has, through his solicitor, T. W. Chapple, given notice of appeal from the judgment given in favor of the plaintiff at the division court of the high court of justice at Toronto. Mr. Jones purchased from the People's Loan and Savings Co. a judgment against T. W. Dale and issued execution under it, seizing a great number of chattels which were claimed by Mrs. Dale and Thos. Parkinson, her tenant. It resulted in an interpleader issue, trial before Chief Justice Armour at the Whitty residence on the 16th ultimo, when judgment was given for all the chattels seized, in favor of the claimants, the plaintiffs, part of them being claimed by Mrs. Dale and the balance by T. Parkinson. The judgment was also for full costs of suit. The defendant was allowed thirty days in which to appeal if so advised. He has now, through his solicitor, given such notice of appeal. At the trial Wallace Nesbitt of Toronto and F. N. Raines of Uxbridge acted for plaintiffs and T. W. Chapple for the defendant.—Journal.

Council met pursuant to statute. Members all present, minutes read and confirmed. Mr. Alan Trull asked to have B. B. Mitchell and William Allan notified to move their fences off the road. Clerk of Manvers asked for \$8, half cost of work on boundary line. Referred to Mr. Clemens. M. S. Bancroft wrote in reference to his brother's funeral expenses. L. K. Morton wrote in reference to line between lots 30 and 31, con. 4. Tenders were received to furnish hemlock plank, from S. Trevail, Geo. A. Stephens, W. Swain and Thos. Brimcombe, laid over. Treasurer submitted his annual statement of accounts; examined, approved and ordered to be published. Mr. Foster having built a bridge and covered another large one in his division, involving the purchase of \$50.91 extra road material, the treasurer was instructed to transfer said amount from Mr. Foster's account to general township account. Accounts passed: R. Windatt, sundries, \$17.50; Samuel Allin, 88 loads of gravel, \$4.40; L. M. Courtie, 45 loads of gravel, \$2.25; J. E. Reid, fencing gravel pit, \$4.40; Dr. Mitchell, medical attendance on indigents, \$17.50; Dr. Potter, certificate of lunacy, \$5.75; Drs. McLaughlin & Beith, do., \$18; John Potter, taking patient to asylum, \$18.60; H. Argue, 3 loads gravel 15c; George Argue, sheep damages, \$4; Eber Millson, 53 loads of gravel, \$4.24; and in favor of the trustees of the several school sections, and in favor of the members of the council for attendance and mileage, and also in the favor of the township officers, pursuant to the provisions of the by-laws in that behalf.
