The treasurer was instructed to pay C J Pearce, insurance agent \$10, being premium for insurance on the hall. The treasurer was instructed to pay H Parsons \$20.25, for corporation printing for 1896, and the clerk \$2.50 for registration book for births, marriages and deaths. The whole council was appointed road and bridge committee. Caretaker Hope was instructed to refund S McKinley \$1.50 which was paid for the use of the hall for a church entertainment. That the first meeting of the court of revision will be held on the last Saturday in May next.

Mr McDonald moved that the reeve, 1st deputy and clerk receive travel for printing. Mr Lambie moved that the reeve and 1st deputy be appointed to ascertain the advisability of cutting brush on Brock road, 13 and 14 concessions. On motion of Mr McDonald the clerk was instructed to take two copies of the Municipal World for use of the council. On motion of Mr McDonald an order was granted in favor of Jno Doble for \$20 for cutting brush on 14th con. A deputation consisting of Messrs E Wheeler, Jno Johnston and Isaac Boynton appeared before the council in behalf of cancelling lease of road allowance between fourth and fifth con on Brock road. The reeve and 1st deputy were instructed to notify the Scugog game preserve company that the lease re certain road allowances to said company is cancelled by action of council consistent with conditions contained in said lease. Mr Weir moved that resolution be forwarded to a P. O. GRAHAM.

The Posts Wanted.

I am in receipt of a communication from a Prince Albert citizen, who is a loyal citizen and a true party man; his complaint is, that at the post office in that village there are no jobs posted. Being a country office many of those who go to that office drive, and if their horses are elsewhere they are compelled to take their horses elsewhere to tie them while they procure their mail.

Some think that the postmaster of that burg, or the owners of the building, or the pathmasters should see that a sufficient number of jobs are placed at the convenience of the public. Some have suggested that a petition, signed by those going to that office, be sent to Postmaster General Mulock, asking that the government make allowance in their next estimate for a number of the posts for Prince Albert postoffice, as the Grit government is in power and will make any reasonable request—sometimes. I would suggest a way to solve the problem: Let each man who has a horse that drives to that office procure a staple for his horse, and fasten each ring to the sidewalk; everyone will be satisfied. Then the postmaster, the owners of the building and the pathmaster will all be relieved of a heavy responsibility.

Housebreaking.

Magistrate Nott is busy here investigating three charges laid against Barney Houck. Sam Hoey and Wildy Ewers, who are charged with breaking into the house of Mr. R. J. Williamson of this place and stealing a new suit of clothes, a violin and an eight-day clock. County Attorney Farewell is prosecuting for the Crown. Ewers' case was heard on Friday evening last, and continued up to midnight, as there are several witnesses yet to be examined the case was adjourned to Thursday, 14th inst. Last Thursday evening Chief Constable McKnight placed Barney Houck in the lock-up in the town hall for safety, when to his behold, Barney picked the lock of his cell with a can opener, and then slipped by the light of the silver moon. It is reported at time of writing that he has been caught. I am sorry to say that we have in town a few boys who are incorrigible and the above is the sequel to the actions of some of those boys. At time of writing it is not known what the result of the case will be, but it is to be hoped that some other boys in town who seem bent on following the footsteps of those concerned in this case will take warning and change their ways quickly, and turn over a new leaf before they are in a similar position. If those in authority had some years ago put the curfew bell in force the fruits of it might have prevented such young lads from now being prosecuted on a criminal charge. It is a sad sight to see boys who are charged to be a credit to themselves and to their parents being in custody for house-breaking.
