> A foal always does better with one or more companion foals. Bran, oats, roots, hay, and water, and dry, clean bedding comfortable, roomy quarters are also conductive to his best thriving. Small feeds regularly given three or four times a day will give better results than lavish feeding, when some of the last feed will require to be taken from the manger. A daily run in a roomy yard, having a smooth surface free from ice, will do much to develop muscle and promote vigor. Underfeed or neglect the foal and you ruin both horse and pocket. Be liberal to the foal, and when he is a yearling and a two-year-old he will be strong enough to look after himself and live
