While unloading bags at Edward Balsden's barn, a gust of wind suddenly blew the door back and Wm. was thrown over the edge of the gangway. Although badly bruised he is apparently not seriously injured.

What do you think, dear readers, the electors of Whitby were asked to express their ideas upon Monday last, aside from the regular election of town and school officials: "Shall or shall not, the cows run at large upon the highways within the limits of the town." One can imagine a majority of councilors being elected upon chance who would submit such a question perhaps, but listen, the electors said by a majority of one that the streets be thrown open for pasture land for the accommodation of the bovines. One would think that on the main streets at least the traffic would keep the grass down sufficiently low to permit pedestrians to get along without the assistance of these cows, but Whitby electors say no, and they are in the best earthly position to judge.

The by-law to repeal local option was defeated on Monday by a majority of 58. This means that the township of Pickering will grant liquor licenses for at least three years to come. Although fifty-eight is a very narrow majority, it is a majority, and the minority must recognize that fact. While many electors were confused over this ballot, it is hard to say how that fact effected the result, as the chances were equal either way. It is said that two magistrates voted contrary to their belief, while one hotel-keeper voted against the by-law. Now that licenses have again been refused, it became those who contend that the public can be accommodated without liquor, to substantiate that claim.

Two weeks ago last Sunday night some person, or persons, broke into W. Logan's store and succeeded in carrying away considerable underwear, several pairs of boots, postage stamps and other portable articles. The merchant did not make the matter known, as would have been natural, but kept perfectly quiet in hope that something would leak out, as he suspected the burglars were no strangers, as entrance was gained to the store through the skylight over the shoe store. The next Sunday afternoon James Gordon and some other came across the stolen goods secreted in the small cottage at the east end of the iron bridge. As this house has not been occupied for some years, the idea was no doubt that it afforded a safe hiding place. During the past week a stranger has been in our midst and rumor has it that he is a detective looking up the guilty parties. While strong suspicion reflects in certain quarters no arrests have as yet been made.

High Constable Calverley, of Whitby, came here Monday morning with warrants for the arrest of L. Wallace and F. Shepherd. As the former had got into trouble Saturday night at Highland Creek, and was in safe keeping, the latter warrant was alone executed and Fred is now awaiting his trial at Whitby. The indictment against these two is horse stealing. It will be remembered that perhaps two months ago or thereabouts, J. H. Gorman's horse and buggy disappeared from the shed at Perrin's hotel, Whitby, one evening. Later in the night these two youths were found at the Rouge Hill, asleep in Holburn's shed, and near at hand was found the horse and buggy. The matter was then dropped, but in the light of recent events, the charge has been acted upon. We deeply regret that these boys should be mixed up in such shady business. This is the first time that Fred has been accused of anything unlawful, and we deeply sympathize with his people. Leslie, although mixed up in shady transactions before, is a good hearted fellow, and capable of much good, if he would only settle down. His people, who are highly respectable, feel keenly the trouble he has caused them. We understand that Shepherd will get his preliminary hearing on the 16th inst. It seems a peculiar thing to keep a prisoner so long in jail before giving him a chance to defend himself.—News.

ORILLIA

When the Gore Vale football club came up from Toronto last 24th of May, and won from the Orillia club in an exhibition game, the prize that was advertised to be given to the winners was not handed over, owing to the slim attendance at the oval, and consequently lack of prize money. Mr. J. Taylor, of Toronto, sec-treas. of the Gore Vales, was in town last week and took the opportunity to remind R. H. Jupp of the fact that his club had not yet received its hard earned trophy. Mr Taylor returned to Toronto empty handed, but reconciled to the inevitable.

There is a conviction in the minds of several prominent townsmen that ice-cutting will be carried on extensively in Orillia this winter, not only by Canadian ice companies, but also by several corporations from the United States. The past month has been a bad one for the making of ice in the "fields" of the northern states. Thus the unseasonable weather that has been in vogue lately and to which is attributed the responsibility for hard times among some people, may prove a blessing and godsend to the very men most in need of work and money.
