

The Gross-Jackson Stabbing Case.

This matter was up for preliminary hearing before Police Magistrate Harper on Friday night last. Major J. E. Farrell represented the crown, and Mr. J. Ball Dow appeared for Mr. E. Gross, the defendant. There were probably 350 people present to hear the evidence.

Jackson and Gross, after which the latter went into his store. Did not see any blows struck. Thought they were trying to fight. Albert Jackson could have hit deft, but he did not. Mr. Dow—Saw Thos Jackson come down the street on a run, and raise his hand to strike deft. Thought he pushed up his sleeves. Gross was running towards his door. I followed fast, as I could see there was likely to be a fight. Gross looked scared as though he feared there would be one. My impression at the start was that deft had reason to fear violence from both the Jacksons. Before the stabbing Albert was standing in front of the door, and there was some talk. Then Jackson opened the door with his hand and put his foot in the opening. Don't think Gross was trying to open the door. The knife was used after Albert put his foot in the door. Something that Gross said after the door was opened caused Jackson to lunge forward, and the knife came out at the same time and met him. Up to the time that Gross went into the store Albert Jackson had not done anything to cause fear, unless the question asked at first was a cause. Albert was following deft on a run when Thos intercepted him. If I had been in deft's place I would have feared trouble. Don't think deft saw Albert saw Albert running after him until after he met Thos, but think I saw Albert Jackson running towards him before he went into the store. Albert told Tom to get out of the way. One could understand from his action that he was peacemaker. It is not likely deft heard Albert tell his brother to "Get out of the way, we don't want any of this here."
