ORILLIA

A Postman for this town

Postmaster General Mulock was in town on Tuesday and incidentally took a look through the Orillia office. Among other things he has asked Postmaster Goffatt to keep track of the drop letters for one month and if a sufficient number are mailed to pay the salary of a letter carrier we are to have a street delivery. Of course the postage on drop letters will then be increased to two cents per letter, as in the city, and it is intended that the extra cent will pay the carrier's salary. The number of letters dropped during the past two days has been over three hundred each day, so that the increased revenue would be over three dollars a day or in the neighborhood of a hundred dollars a month—a sum more than sufficient to pay the salaries of two letter carriers. The Postmaster General characterizes the post office building as a botch job. It is to be hoped that he will make such improvements as will give the public a little more room in front. If the drop letter box were moved ten feet farther north it would give much greater space at the general delivery wicket. Just as yet, Mr. Mulock, we don't know whether we want a postman or not at a cost of \$8 per day.

All finished at the Severn

The blasting operations on the east branch of the Severn river on both sides of Rattlesnake island, were finished on Monday, and what seems to be a very satisfactory job done. Stop logs have been placed in position at both chutes, all in readiness to be raised when the spring floods necessitate such action, these logs are about 18 feet long and when they are raised the surplus water will be quickly run out of the lake. The blasting plan of the 16 men who worked at the Severn were transferred on Monday to McDonald's chute on the river below Sparrow Lake, whose operations are in progress to open up a wider channel to prevent the flooding of the lands about Sparrow Lake in the spring, when the stop logs at Washago are raised to prevent the raising of lakes Conchiching and Simcoe. This work will be finished in three months. Mr. Sam Graham has charge of the camp at McDonald's.

Seed Distribution.

The Ottawa Experimental Farm Director is now prepared to distribute samples of seeds for testing. His communication reads thus:—

Ed. CHRONINLE, Whitby, Ont.—During the past nine years, samples of those varieties of grain which have succeeded best on the Experimental Farms have been distributed on application in 3 lb. bags to farmers in all parts of the Dominion, free through the mail. The object in view in this distribution has been to add to the productiveness and improve the quality of these important agricultural products throughout the country by placing within reach of every farmer pure seed of the most productive sorts. This work has met with much appreciation and a considerable degree of success. Instructions have been given by the Hon. Minister of Agriculture to make a similar distribution this season. Owing to the very large number of applications now received it is not practicable to send more than one sample to each applicant, but with this limitation it is hoped that the stock available will be sufficient to permit of every farmer who so desires sharing in the benefits of this useful branch of the work of the Experimental Farms. The distribution now in progress consists of some of the most promising sorts, Oats, Barley, Spring Wheat, Pease, Field Corn and Potatoes. Requests for samples may be sent to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, at any time before the 1st of March, but after that date the lists will be closed, so that the applications then on hand may be filled before seeding begins. All communications can be sent free of postage. It is desirable that each applicant should name the variety which he desires to test, also one or two alternative sorts in case the stock of the sort chosen should be exhausted, and the variety promise can be made that the wheat asked for will be sent, the wishes of correspondents will be attended to as far as possible. The samples of grain will be sent early, but potatoes cannot be distributed until the danger of injury in transit by frost is over. WM. SAUNDERS, Director, Experimental Farms, Ottawa.
