About four years ago Mr. A. Sinclair,

worked a farm near Sonya, Mariposa
township, moved with his family to
Hamilton, Pembina Co., North Da-
kota, a short distance from the Cana-
dian border, where he took up a half
section of land, and has prospered well.
Two years ago he harvested 11,000
bushels of grain, and last year over
5,000. In addition to this his own
health as well as the health of his wife
(who is a sister of Mr. Joseph Maunder,
town), has been wonderfully benefited.
When Mr. Sinclair left here his daugh-
ter had been given up by local physi-
cians, but to-day is a healthy and vigor-
ous specimen of womanhood, thanks
to the dry western climate. Mrs. Sin-
clair has been in this section for some
time past on a visit with relatives, and
returned home a few days ago.

Mr. Wm. Wood, of North Harvey,
is having his share of affliction. Four
weeks ago, says the Independent, his
wife died under distressing circum-
stances, and on Sunday his daughter,
Martha Jane, aged 16, who had suffer-

animal was got out of the water. Then
two large fires of fence rails, etc., were
burned on the ice, and between these the
shivering beast—which had been in the
icy water for over an hour—was placed
to thaw out and dry. It was a narrow
escape for both driver and horse. We
understand there are many airholes in
the ice on the lower river, and drivers
cannot be too careful, but the recent
heavy frosts has no doubt removed this
danger to a considerable degree.—

than the cost, surely the whole section
could afford one twentieth of \$6,000 to
fix the school house. One more griev-
ance is that the water in the well is un-
fit to drink every summer. The

ances exist as well as any one, but he
has no interest in the school and takes
the opportunity to vent a little private
spite, and perhaps please some of his
friends by calling people hard names.
