MARKHAM

A case that is particularly sad in all its particulars is that of James Hebson who was charged before Magistrates Wilson and Vanzant Thursday evening of last week with assaulting his father and mother, and aged couple well and favorably known by all. The assault was committed on Saturday and Sunday mornings 16th and 17th. When brought before the magistrates he pleaded guilty and was given a chance to leave town in four or five days or pay a fine of \$20 in default of which he is to serve 90 days in jail. Messrs. Holmes & Gregory, on behalf of C. M. Vanderburg, of the township of Markham, have originated proceedings to contest the county council election in Markham division. In this division, the result, as officially declared is as follows: F. K. Reesor, 544; W. H. Hall, 540; Ex-warden Slater, 523; Dr. Robinson, 238. The ground on which it is sought to void the election of Messrs. Hall and Reesor, is that a number of those whose names are on the municipal voters lists were refused ballot papers on the ground that taxes were not paid. It is said there are 300 names on the defaulters list, of whom a number sought to vote, but were prevented, and that their votes, if recorded, might have affected the result. For years it has been the practice in Markham to those in arrears, but it is claimed the proceeding is unwarranted, as no by-law has been passed on the point.
