It is a proceeding we do not encourage ourselves but it is in every way contrary to Methodist church discipline and consequently methodists should withhold from partaking in the old time fascinations. Now we are led to believe had the matter been properly thought out some of the now guilty ones would have been conspicuous by their non attendance. We do not wish to raise our voices in condemnation of our fellow beings, but simply wish to direct their attention to public opinion in matters of serious import, as an example of any distasteful nature to the church should be fairly considered. While it may not perhaps be in our power to make it mean eternal ruin to others. One mystery about this matter presents itself to our mind why in the name of justice, if it is right for methodists to participate in dancing, why do its members withhold from all its pleasures for years after their connection with the church of their choice and break out in the old time amusement when the opportunity presents itself in the enjoyment of our church goes here. But we trust after bringing matters fairly before their minds they will like the prodigal of old consider their ways and return to the office of abstinence to abstain from all appearance of evil.
