BEAVERTON

Our contemporary the Whitty Chronicle referring to our recent remarks in reference to the new county of Otonochieing proposed by Orillia and that the CHRONICLE "was no authority in the matter of the feelings of the residents of this portion of the county of Ontario, has this to say: "Well, if the Express is good authority let it speak out, and we will hold our peace. However, we are about off entirely, however, we should like to make an observation or two. In the first place the county of Ontario is very slightly concerned as to the outcome of the matter one way or the other. It costs a great deal to bring witnesses and constables from the north part of this county on criminal cases, while jurymen and county councillors have collected about \$300 a year in mileage. As to the nuisance the present system is to men in the north having business in the county town we are scarcely able to form an estimate, but any person who takes up a map and notes the large out of the way districts which have to go to Whitty and Barrie to transact county business will be able to know at least that it is a great nuisance. On the other hand Orillia is central wealthy, beautifully situated and convenient. Besides it is also a historic spot and judgment tells him that it should have been a county town from the first and if this be so then every day's delay means another day's wrong and inconvenience. Those who oppose the formation of this new county can only do so on selfish grounds.—Whitty CHRONICLE.—It may possibly be within the memory of the CHRONICLE that Mr. Peter Thompson, a much respected gentleman, lost his seat at the council board of Mara township for showing his sympathy for the movement. Also that the township of Thorold, and the municipality of Beaverton have committees appointed for the purpose of watching and blocking legislation in this direction. As a matter of fact there is much that is true in what our contemporary urges but the people of this section have put up with existing conditions for many years and old associations and traditions are not so readily shaken off as our friends of Whitty and Orillia seem to suppose. The Express is not antagonistic to the scheme, by any means. PRINCE ALBERT.

The WCTU secured the services of Col W. G. Haskell, official lecturer of the National Keely League, who gave the people of this village on Thursday evening in the basement of the Methodist church a very interesting, instructive, and earnest temperance lecture. He condemned in the strongest language the legalized traffic of intoxicating drinks, and called upon the christian public to arise and indicate their temperance and christian principles by demanding from our law makers the prohibition of the manufacture, importation, and sale of intoxicants. In speaking of the great evil of intemperance he showed very clearly that no tongue can tell, no pen can write, no mind can conceive, the sad results of the unholy traffic. The lecturer presented the claims of the thousands, and the tens of thousands of confirmed drunkards in our land in the most forcible manner. He proclaimed infamy and moralism a disease, but not incurable. He said Dr. Keesley, a physician, a graduate of Rush Medical College, and Dr. Lanes of Missouri State University, who had spent eleven years of study in investigating and experimenting the truthfulness of his profession by thousands of cures.
