MARKHAM
Mrs Larway, an old lady of eighty years, residing with her son-in-law, Mr Albert Smith, on the 7th concession of Markham, met with a peculiar accident Tuesday. She was getting out of bed in the morning when she fell and broke her leg. Dr Macdonald was called and set the limb.

Frank Robinson has sued the village of Markham for \$36, the price of an inspirator, which he claims he sold the village through ex Coun. Morrison about three years ago. There is no resolution on the books authorizing Mr Morrison or anybody else to buy an inspirator, and no account was ever rendered for the same until three or four weeks ago. The council will defend the suit, it is said.

Hall and Reesor
The election in this county council division Thursday resulted in the return of the same two representatives as elected in January, with practically the same majority between Hall and Slater, considering percentage of increase in the vote. In the west Slater made large gains and in the east correspondingly lost. His largest increase was in sub-division No. 2, Markham township, where he gained 69. In No. 7, Markham, Reesor increased his vote by 82, while Hall's largest gain was in Markham village, exactly 50 in each sub-division, but in no division did Hall's vote fall behind that of last year. The total vote amounted to 2531 as against 1847 last year. The result is generally satisfactory and it is to be hoped that no more elections will have to be held in this division until 1899. Reesor has a majority over Hall of 122 and over Slater 148, while Hall has 26 votes more than Slater.—Economist.

STOUFVILLE
Hiram Staley, charged with stealing a quantity of trees and shrubs from lot 41, 6th con. of Whitechurch, the property of the Trust Corporation of Ontario, was tried at the assizes in Toronto last week. Mr W P Bull, who appeared for Staley, entered a plea of "autrefois acquit." To support this Magistrate Love and Yule, of Aurora, were called. They swore that the case was withdrawn and not tried. His Honor and Mr Dewart both held that the case should go to the jury since, according to the magistrates, the case had never been tried, and that the magistrates had no jurisdiction. Mr Bull said that the only question for the jury was whether or not Staley took the timber with felonious intent. Mr Dewart said the question was, did the goods in question exceed \$25 in value? If not the case should have been dealt with in a minor court. The case was given to the jury about 5 o'clock, and shortly after 6 o'clock they returned a verdict of guilty, with a strong recommendation to mercy. Judge McDougall sentenced Staley to two months in the county jail with hard labor.—Free Press.
